Dear SBCCD Community,

This year, we served over 29,100 students—exceeding our enrollment goal by more than 10%. That kind of progress doesn't happen by chance. It's the result of deep collaboration between our board, faculty, staff, and partners who believe in the power of education to change lives.

Together, we've stayed focused on what matters most—removing barriers and expanding opportunity for all. Here's how we advanced our shared goals:

Goal 1: Eliminate Barriers to Student Access and Success

- ▶ Opened new job training facilities at Crafton Hills College and San Bernardino Valley College.
- ▶ Broke ground on a workforce development center at the Economic Development & Corporate Training Center with U.S. Commerce leaders and regional partners.

Goal 2: Be a Diverse, Equitable, Inclusive, and Anti-Racist Institution

- ► CHC ranked top 3 statewide for supporting Black student success in math (Campaign for College Opportunity).
- ▶ SBVC named College of the Year for expanding Credit for Prior Learning to 111 courses (CCC Chancellor's Office).

Goal 3: Be a Regional Leader and Partner in Addressing Regional Issues

- ► Launched on-campus Medi-Cal enrollment help through a first-in-the-state Inland Empire Health Plan partnership.
- Our CalFresh partnership with the County of San Bernardino was spotlighted in the state's new Master Plan for Career Education as a model for combating student hunger.

Goal 4: Ensure Fiscal Accountability and Sustainability

- Completed a districtwide technology audit to better connect services, lower costs, and improve support for students and employees.
- Finalized the 2025–2037 Facilities Master Plan to guide future investments in learning environments.

Through data-driven strategies and a strong commitment to community impact, SBCCD is helping build a more inclusive and prosperous future for the Inland Empire and California.



SBCCD is dedicated to removing barriers to higher education by raising public awareness, building strategic partnerships, securing grant funding, and expanding career pathways. These efforts ensure that all learners, particularly those historically underserved, receive the resources and support needed to succeed academically and personally.

OUTCOMES

Elevated Visibility & Advocacy

SBCCD boosted its public profile through dynamic marketing, impactful community events, and legislative engagement, leading to higher enrollment, greater legislative support, and stronger community connections.

Transformative Collaborations

Partnering with the Time for Change Foundation and the US Green Building Council has improved training opportunities and support services, creating a more inclusive learning environment that fosters student growth.

Fueling Innovation & Growth

New Bachelor's degrees in Respiratory Care and Water Resource Management, along with expanded living-wage certificates, demonstrates SBCCD's commitment to meeting workforce demands.

Targeted Action Through Analytics

Data dashboards revealed challenges for probationary students in distance learning and highlighted strategies to support underserved groups, leading SBCCD to adjust courses, counseling, and outreach to improve outcomes.

Comprehensive Student Support Services

SBCCD's wraparound services—ranging from food and clothing to mental health support via TimelyCare—help meet basic needs and promote academic progress.



STUDENT IMPACTS

- SBCCD empowered 8 students to achieve their dreams by securing places in NASA's robotics and engineering project.
- SBCCD has provided essential support and resources to 61 justice-involved students who have obtained the skills they need to secure better opportunities.
- Educated 80 students at Berlyn Elementary on career pathways in the Film, Television, and Media program—stimulating early interest in college and creative industries.
- Each year, a student receives mentorship from top glass artists at Pilchuck Glass School, gaining skills and professional connections.



Historic Dual Enrollment Expansion

SBCCD expanded dual enrollment to give more high school students free access to college courses, helping them build confidence, save money, and succeed at higher rates than the general student population.

Student Impact

- More high school students gained access to free, college-level coursework.
- Helped students build confidence, accelerate degree progress, and save on college costs.
- ▶ Dual enrollment students had a course success rate of 88%, compared to 74% for the general population.



SBCCD deepened its commitment to equity by advancing DEIA training, reimagining governance for broader participation, and using disaggregated data to inform action. Building on Goal 1, the district worked to ensure all students—especially those historically underserved—benefit from inclusive policies and continuous improvement.

OUTCOMES

DEIA Training & Governance

Eighty-eight faculty completed equity training through the USC Race and Equity Center, alongside participating managers and classified staff. Governance structures were updated to foster inclusive, transparent decisionmaking, reinforcing a districtwide culture centered on equity and shared leadership.

Redesigned Hiring & Onboarding

Anti-bias Equal Opportunity Employment training was expanded, and a Bias Education and Action Team was launched. The "Belonging @ SBCCD" initiative emphasized wellness, learning, and support for all employees.

Improved Student Outcomes

Disaggregated data revealed that transfer-level English completion rose from 2022–23 to 2023–24 among Black/African American and Hispanic students, showing significant strides in closing achievement gaps.

Equity-Minded Surveys & Insights

Two major surveys—the 2025 Real College California Survey and the Healthy Minds Study—revealed student needs related to basic needs and mental health, helping the district shape responsive support services.





STUDENT IMPACTS

- California Adult Education
 Program Transition counselors identified 10 common barriers faced by adult education students and developed targeted strategies and resources to support their success.
- Data analytics tracked course withdrawals by student demographics and reasons, informing targeted retention strategies.
- Supported student athletes with counseling, educational planning, and class registration.



Basic Needs and Food Support Expansion

SBCCD expanded its wraparound support through new programs like Inland Empire Health Plan College Care and a streamlined CalFresh process, improving access to basic needs and helping students stay healthy, focused, and engaged.

Student Impact

- Services offer replicable models for sustainable, high-impact student support.
- Aligns resource allocation with student success, promoting responsiveness to equity gaps.
- Reinforced a culture of care and holistic success.

SBCCD strengthened its role as a regional partner through internal collaboration, public engagement, emergency readiness, environmental stewardship, and student-centered workforce development. These efforts positioned the district as a proactive, innovative ally to local partners while providing transformative experiences for students.

OUTCOMES

Robust Community Engagement

SBCCD participated in major regional events—including Winterfest, chamber galas, and KVCR's Ring Ceremony—underscoring its commitment to civic partnerships.

Elevated Safety & Risk Management

FEMA-aligned training was implemented with CSU and local partners. New MOUs and upgraded emergency communications enhanced regional response capacity.

Environmental Stewardship & Hands-On Internships

Nearly 28,000 sq. ft. of turf was replaced with droughttolerant landscaping as part of the district's pursuit of Alliance for Water Stewardship (AWS) certification.





- Students gained technical and professional skills through paid, career-aligned internships at KVCR.
- Emergency systems ensured continuity of learning and safety during regional crises.
- Updated plans and protocols laid the groundwork for future programs and student support.
- Connected students to careers in legal aid, public service, and advocacy through partnerships in immigration and youth justice initiatives such as the California Youth Leadership Corps.



Facilities Investments and Sustainability

SBCCD opened a state-of-the-art Applied Technology Building, reinforcing the district's commitment to innovative and sustainable infrastructure.

Student Impact

- Solar energy now generates over 4.1M kWh annually, reducing long-term utility costs.
- The building itself serves as a learning lab for green technologies, energy systems, and environmentally conscious design.
- Modernized infrastructure improved accessibility & positioned SBCCD as a sustainability leader.

SBCCD advanced fiscal sustainability through strengthened financial systems, targeted designations and grants, and environmentally conscious infrastructure.



Strengthened Budget Guidelines & Governance

Staff completed training on updated budget guidelines and the revised chart of accounts. The Budget Committee refined funding principles to ensure high-priority needs are protected during fiscal challenges.

National Designations & Grants

SBCCD earned Hispanic-Serving Institution designation for 2023–2025 and is pursuing Black-Serving Institution status, expanding access to federal grants like Title V to support historically underserved students.

Veteran Credit for Prior Learning

Through the California Military Articulation Platform, SBCCD awarded Area E credit to 40 veteran students—saving nearly \$600,000 in tuition and advancing the district's commitment to affordable, accessible education for service members.

Optimized Financial Systems & Practices

SBCCD strengthened fiscal operations by aligning financial systems across Oracle, Questica, and County platforms, while implementing multi-factor authentication to improve data security and reconciliation.

Sustainable Infrastructure & Facilities

All new and renovated buildings were integrated into energy management systems, with the Performing Arts Center on track for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Platinum certification—advancing SBCCD's strategic sustainability goals.


