5. RECONVENE PUBLIC MEETING

Mr. Lockwood reconvened the public meeting at 4:18 p.m.

6. REPORT OF ACTION IN CLOSED SESSION

Mr. Futch moved, Dr. Singer seconded, and the Board members present voted to approve a settlement for Padua Glass Enterprises, Inc. in the amount of \$28,330.78.

9. <u>Consideration of Approval to Ratify Health and Welfare Benefits</u> <u>Tentative Agreement - CTA</u>

<u>Dr. Singer moved</u>, Mr. Longville seconded, and the Board members present voted to ratify the CTA Tentative Agreement on Article 11: Health and Welfare Benefits.

10. <u>Consideration of Approval to Ratify Health and Welfare Benefits</u> <u>Tentative Agreement - CSEA</u>

Mr. Longville moved, Mr. Futch seconded, and the Board members present voted to ratify the CSEA Tentative Agreement on Article 10: Health and Welfare Benefits.

11. BUDGET

The 2012-2013 budget was presented by Vice Chancellor Charlie Ng. He explained that a simple majority is needed to pass the November 6, 2012 tax initiative which raises sales tax by 0.25% and increases personal income taxes for individuals earning more than \$250,000. Passage of the initiative includes a "deferral buy-back," no COLA, no

growth or restoration of funded students, consolidation of all categorical funds and block grants instead of state mandates. For our district, this would mean the \$3.1 million deficit ending 2012-2013 would need to come from the fund balance.

If the November tax fails, the district would be impacted by a \$3.67 million trigger cut, a 6.4% workload reduction which equates to 805 FTES, 2,260 headcount or 208 sections, and block grants instead of state mandates. For our district, this would mean a \$6 million deficit which would need to come from the fund balance. Budget directions to consider include cutting an additional 100 sections from the 2012-2013 budget, implementing a Supplemental Early Retirement Program, implementing layoffs and furloughs, freezing step and column increases, and reducing the cost of health benefits and General Fund support for KVCR.

Mr. Ng recommended that we keep the district's fund balance to at least 15%, and the Board concurred. We need to be sensitive to the full-time obligation number and the 50% law. He said the goal is to meet with the unions regarding the negotiable items between now and November. Trustees Ferracone and Singer agreed that cutting sections should not be our priority, and we need to put our funding in the areas where we can have the highest number of classes and insure the success of our students. The trustees felt very strongly about the importance of serving students and retaining class sections to the extent possible.

The tentative budget will be presented to the Board June 14, 2012. The final budget will be presented for adoption on September 6, 2012. Mr. Ng said the goal is to meet with the unions between now and November to negotiate cost saving items associated with the union contracts.

12. SAFETY

Mr. Ng presented an update on the safety program. He reviewed goals for effective safety and compliance along with identified items needing improvement and the district's approach to implement those improvements. The current status of our safety programs include safety newsletters, distribution of workers' compensation claim information to all managers and maintaining a safety website. Programs have been revised and training is ongoing. Job hazards have been assessed and proper signage and new equipment has been improved and installed. Facilities are receiving current inspections. Inventory of hazardous materials is current, and we continue to provide safety supplies and protective equipment. We are current on our compliance reporting. SBVC has been identified by the state to be audited on Celery Act requirements. Safety committees are meeting. Next steps include converting an existing funded position to assist the district in complying with emergency preparedness requirements, continuing safety plan enhancements and training and the development of training programs for adjunct faculty.

Mr. Longville said this is one of his major focuses. He is very pleased that Chancellor Baron has put safety a high priority, and it appears that we are making dramatic progress.

Mr. Lockwood asked for a semi-annual report on safety.

NEW DEGREE

English Associate of Arts for Transfer (AA-T) A.A. Degree Major

English is the study and production of writing in English, especially literature. The elements and structures of fiction, poetry, drama and the essay are studied. The ethnic, cultural, social, economic and historical foundations of literary works are analyzed as well as their influences on the creation and reception of those works. Finally, there is a strong emphasis in writing for a variety of purposes, audiences, and effects. The study of English prepares a student for further study in Literature, Creative Writing, Journalism and other closely related fields. In addition, the skills and abilities cultivated by the study of English are excellent preparation for any field which requires wide literacy and solid writing ability, including teaching/education, advertising, law, public relations, and work in the media.

Students planning to transfer to a four-year institution and major in English (or associated disciplines such as Comparative Literature, Journalism or Creative Writing) should consult with a counselor regarding the transfer process and lower division requirements because additional courses may be required at some institutions or they may require you to take specific courses. In addition, the department recommends that students take at least 2 semesters of a foreign language as many 4-year institutions have foreign language requirements for their BA in English.

Completion of CSU GE-Breadth or IGETC for CSU is required in addition to the major requirements listed below.

The Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act (Senate Bill 1440, now codified in California Education Code sections 66746-66749) guarantees admission to a California State University (CSU) campus for any community college student who completes an "associate degree for transfer", a newly established variation of the associate degrees traditionally offered at a California community college. The Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or the Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) is intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree in a similar major at a CSU campus. Students completing these degrees (AA-T or AS-T) are guaranteed admission to the CSU system, but not to a particular campus or major. In order to earn one of these degrees, students must complete a minimum of 60 required semester units of CSU-transferable coursework with a minimum GPA of 2.0. Students transferring to a CSU campus that does accept the AA-T or AS-T will be required to complete no more than 60 units after transfer to earn a bachelor's degree (unless the major is a designated "high-unit" major). This degree may not be the best option for students intending to transfer to a particular CSU campus or to university or college that is not part of the CSU system. Students should consult with a counselor when planning to complete the degree for more information on university admission and transfer requirements.

To earn this AA-T degree, students must meet the following requirements:

- completion of the following major requirements with grades of C or better
- completion of a minimum of 60 CSU transferable semester units with a grade point average of at least 2.0; and
- certified completion of the CSU General Education Breadth requirements (CSU GE), which requires a minimum of 39 units.
 Completing courses prior to transfer that satisfy the U.S. History, Constitution and American Ideals requirement as part of CSU GE is highly recommended.

Students planning to transfer to a four-year institution and major in English should consult with a counselor regarding the transfer process and lower division requirements.

MODIFY DEGREE

Liberal Arts A.A. Degree Major

The Associate Degree in Liberal Arts is designed for students who wish a broad knowledge of liberal arts and sciences plus additional coursework in an "Area of Emphasis". An area of emphasis is ideal for students planning to transfer to the California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC). Students can satisfy required general education requirements, plus focus on transferable course work that relates to majors at CSU or UC. Students are advised to consult with a counselor for specific information regarding choice of major and transfer university. Students may obtain an Associate of Arts Degree in Liberal Arts by completing a minimum of 60 semester units as outlined below.

It is recommended that students complete either the IGETC or the CSUGE for the general education pattern related to their educational goal. Students are also strongly advised to consult with a counselor relative to required courses for the selected option.

For either the IGETC or CSUGE option, 39-48 units of general education are required.

- Complete 18 units in one "Area of Emphasis" from those outlined below. For depth of study, a minimum of two courses in one discipline is required. (Note: Where appropriate, courses in the "Area of Emphasis" may also be counted for Associate Degree Option #1 or #2.)

The General Manager, KVCR TV/FM plans, organizes, coordinates and directs the operations of the San Bernardino Community College District public radio station, KVCR-FM and the public television station, KVCR-TV. The General Manager provides leadership and guidance participating in the review and execution of the District policies, programs and concerns as they relate to the stations' broadcast operations and the community.

ANALYSIS

It is necessary to develop a job description to meet the requirements of the Police Academy Department and KVCR TV/FM.

SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

Under the administrative direction of the Dean of Criminal Justice, the Director, Police Academy plans, organizes, directs, and manages the programs and operations of the San Bernardino County Sherriff Department (SBCSD) Intensive Academy at the Frank Bland Regional Training Center and the San Bernardino Valley College Extended Format Academy certificate programs and in-service training for police; and perform administrative support duties related to the operations of the Policy Academy.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

The following duties are typical for this classification.

- 1. Plan, organize, direct, and provide leadership for the programs, projects and activities of the Police Academy to create effective learning environments for students.
- 2. - 6. Provide leadership for program development, implementation, evaluation and revision of the curriculum.
- 7. Administer external accreditations and assure regulatory compliance with the California Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.
- 8. Maintain current knowledge of new developments and innovations in Police Academy Programs; recommend changes to maintain relevance and meet student and community needs; conduct instructional needs assessments as appropriate.
- 9. Monitor registration in program classes; recommend opening of new class section and the cancellation of classes.

GENERAL MANAGER, KVCR TV/FM

Class specifications are intended to present a descriptive list of the range of duties performed by employees in the class. Specifications are <u>not</u> intended to reflect all duties performed within the job; however, any additional duties will be reasonably related to this class.

DEFINITION:

Under administrative direction, plans, organizes, coordinates and directs the operations of the San Bernardino Community College District public radio station, KVCR-FM and the public television station, KVCR-TV. The General Manager provides leadership and guidance participating in the review and execution of the District policies, programs and concerns as they relate to the stations' broadcast operations and the community.

As General Manager of the District radio and television stations, the incumbent functions as the administrator of broadcast operations and programs. In this capacity, the incumbent reports to the District Chancellor and is charged with the responsibility of planning, organizing and administering the public service radio and television operations and related activities. Related activities include the planning and coordination of Distance Education deliver systems, including broadcast, satellite, microwave, ITFS and other methods of electronically delivering instructional material from one point to another within the District to serve Crafton Hills College, San Bernardino College and the District Office.

EXAMPLES OF DUTIES:

Specific duties include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Plans, organizes, prepares and administers the budget for the functions and activities of the District radio and television stations.
- 2. Develops, plans and coordinates community service programming and operations of the radio and television stations resulting in high-quality broadcasting services to the Inland Empire.
- 3. Prepares, submits and administers state and federal grants for both the public radio and public television stations.
- 4. Prepares, maintains and submits reports, licenses and applications to state and federal agencies including the Federal Communications Commission, Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Public Telecommunications Facilities Program, National Public Radio and the Public Broadcasting Service.
- 5. Plans, coordinates and consults with the Chancellor and College Presidents to provide instructional delivery systems including broadcast, microwave, satellite, ITFS and other

methods of delivery to and from Crafton Hills College, San Bernardino Valley College, The District Office and other Inland Empire locations.

- 6. Meets, coordinates and consults with administrators, faculty, staff, students and the general public on radio and television programming and related activities.
- 7. Participates in and makes recommendations on the hiring, supervision and evaluation of radio and television classified staff.
- 8. Develops, enhances and expands development efforts for both stations in all areas of fundraising.
- 9. Represents the radio and television stations at professional meetings relating to the programming, funding and operations of public broadcasting entities.
- 10. Develops and maintains an on-going involvement in the community.
- 11. Performs other related duties as may be required or assigned by the Chancellor.

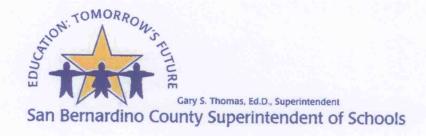

OVERVIEW

Construction change orders may be generated by a number of circumstances. These include changes directed by the District to address contractor or architect recommendations for efficiency, occupant needs, or to improve future building or space usability. California Public Contract Code 20118.4 establishes a guideline that limits construction contract change orders to 10% of the base contract amount.

A construction contract is amended when there is a change in the scope of work due to unforeseen conditions that must be corrected in order for work to proceed. Amendments alter the base contract amount and are not limited to the 10% guideline.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

ANALYSIS

Construction contract amendments and change orders submitted with this board item total \$16,082.00, which is 0.062% of the total Measure M construction contracts of \$25,902,121.45.

The total of all Measure M amendments and change orders, including those submitted this month, increases the Bond Measure M construction contracts by \$1,019,497.49. The new overall Measure M change order percentage is 3.94%. The cost of these changes will be absorbed by bid savings; the construction projects remain within the approved budget.

OVERVIEW

At its April 17, 2012 meeting, District Assembly approved Board Policy 3740 Emergency Notification System and requested that this policy be submitted to the Board for approval.

At its May 1, 2012 meeting, District Assembly approved Board Policy 2060 Student Trustees and 2070 Advisory Voting Student Member of the Board of Trustees and requested that these policies be submitted to the Board for approval.

These policies were submitted to the Board of Trustees for First Reading on May 17, 2012.

ANALYSIS

The Board may adopt policies authorized by law or determined to be necessary for the efficient operation of the district.

- I. Institutional Effectiveness
- II. Enhanced and Informed Governance and Leadership

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

None.

STUDENT TRUSTEES

The Board shall include two (2) non-voting student members (one representing each college in the District). The term of office shall be one year commencing at the first Board meeting in June and terminating on the last Board meeting in May of each academic year. (In the event the Board of Trustees extends the privileges of the student trustees, the term shall begin on May 15 of each calendar year.)

The student member shall be a resident of California at the time of nomination, and during the term of service, and shall be enrolled in and maintain a minimum of five (5) semester units in the District at the time of nomination and throughout the term of service. The student member is not required to give up employment with the District. The student shall maintain a 2.0 grade point average (GPA) during the term of office.

The student members shall be chosen by the students enrolled in the district as follows:

 The student member shall be elected by all the students enrolled in the respective college in a general election held for that purpose. Normally an election will be held in the spring semester so that the office is filled by June 1. Special elections shall be held if the office becomes vacant by reason of the resignation or disqualification of an elected student member, or by any other reasons. Special elections shall be held within thirty (30) days after notice of the vacancy comes to the attention of the Chancellor provided the vacancy occurs in the first half of the term of office. The ASB may appoint for the remainder of the term when a vacancy occurs in the last half of the term of office. Candidates for the position may nominate themselves or be nominated by others by the filing of an application at their campus of residence certifying that the candidate is eligible for service under the criteria set forth in California law and these policies.

An election will be conducted at each college in accordance with the administrative procedures adopted by the college student elections, except that all members of the student body shall be permitted to vote for the student member. Each candidate from throughout the District who has qualified shall be listed on the ballot at each college. The successful candidate must receive a plurality of all votes cast.

 The student member shall be seated with the Board and shall be recognized as a full member of the Board at meetings. The student member is entitled to participate in discussion of issues and receive all materials presented to members of the Board (except for closed session). The student member shall be entitled to any mileage allowance necessary to attend Board meetings to the same extent as publicly elected trustees.

On or before May 15 of each year, the Board must reconfirm the following student trustee privileges:

- The privilege to receive compensation for meeting attendance at a level of \$100 per month.
 - The privilege to make and second motions.
- The privilege to vote in an advisory capacity.
- The privilege to serve a term commencing on May 15.
- If one or more of these privileges is granted, the term will commence on May 15 of each calendar year.

SAN BERNARDINO COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT BOARD POLICY

ADVISORY VOTING STUDENT MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

In compliance with Education Code Section 72023.5, the Board of Trustees of the San Bernardino Community College District may include two advisory voting student members who are enrolled in and maintain at least 5 (five semester units full-time students of in the District.

The student members of the Board shall be entitled to all privileges and rights provided elected members of the Board, including receiving of materials and participating in the questioning of witnesses and the discussion of issues, with the following exceptions:

1. The student member shall not have the right or be afforded the opportunity to either attend closed sessions of the Governing Board or receive materials related thereto.

2. The student member may be entitled to compensation of \$50 \$100 per month as prescribed by Education Code Section 72425. In the event a student Board member has an unexcused absence to a required meeting, the compensation shall be pro rated for the pay period.

3. The student member shall not be entitled to vote on matters being considered by the Board of Trustees except in an advisory capacity that will not be tallied into the official vote.

The term of the student member shall be one year, commencing on, May 15 each fiscal year. The student will be seated at the next regular Board meeting following the beginning of their one-year term of office.

The student Board member shall meet the eligibility requirements as outlined in Board Policy 1215. 2060.

There will be many changes between now and then based on our year end activity and the final budget approved by the State.

2012-13 Tentative Budget

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June 14, 2012

Dear Members of the Board of Trustees:

I am pleased to present the tentative budget for fiscal year ending June 30, 2013. This budget was developed in accordance with Title 5, the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual, the best practices of the Government Finance Officers Association, and the fiscal policies set by the Board of Trustees. The passage of the tentative budget is necessary in order for the district to operate starting July 1, 2012.

As you may know, the Governor has assumed in his May Revision Budget that a tax initiative passes in November, with a "trigger cut" assumed if the initiative does not pass. The funded full-time equivalent student (FTES) if the tax initiative passes is estimated to be 13,067 FTES. The funded FTES if the tax initiative does not pass is estimated to be 12,262. The district is targeting 12,665 FTES, 402 FTES less than the scenario where the taxes pass and 403 FTES more than the scenario where the taxes do not pass. The strategy is to split the estimated difference between the two scenarios heading into November, knowing that the district will have to make an adjustment in spring. We believe it will be easier to add or cut 400 FTES in spring rather than add or cut 800 FTES in spring.

We continue to be faced with budget challenges for fiscal year 2012-13 which are likely to continue for the foreseeable future. Significant reductions in revenue and increased expenditures, while pursuing our highest priorities, goals, and objectives form the starting point for this financial plan. This budget assumes a 0.3% decrease in state-funded enrollment and associated impact on other revenues and a 4.7% decrease in expenditures. The budget assumes a net 7% increase in health and welfare benefit costs, contractual step increases, and implementation of the goals and objectives of the district's strategic plan. The fund balance (reserve) is estimated to decrease \$4.6 million to an estimated \$13.2 million on June 30, 2013, or 18.1% of the expenditure budget. The Board has set 15% as the minimum requirement while the State has a 5% minimum requirement.

The Board has adopted a series of budget directions that has guided the development of a strategic budget which carefully balances the need to provide access to educational resources for our communities and supporting academic excellence in the classroom. It also preserves our commitment to our faculty and staff. No layoffs of full-time or part-time contract employees have been recommended as a result of district finances.

We must again acknowledge the hard work and sacrifice of our faculty and staff. We could not have accomplished this balanced budget without their support and cooperation. The significant budget reductions of the past few years have relied heavily upon sacrifice by every member of the SBCCD community. We've implemented a series of cost-cutting measures including reducing enrollment, being selective about filling positions, reducing budgets in operational programs, and reallocating resources to meet the highest priority needs. In addition, we will continue to examine line items in the budget to be sure we are prudent with our spending. These savings will be used to assist in balancing the budget in future years.

However, it must be stated that our ability to "get by" on savings from one year to the next and cutting operations to the bone is coming even closer to an end. The budget for Fiscal Year 2013 will require a contribution from the ending fund balance to balance the budget. We must continue to reinvent ourselves. This means that we must look carefully at how we are organized and how we are delivering services to determine if we are effective and efficient. We must look carefully at new revenue opportunities that will continue to supplement our state appropriations. And we must continue to look further at exploring partnership opportunities so that public and private entities, coming together, can join their resources and efforts to achieve exciting and measurable outcomes for our students.

This budget demonstrates our commitment to our students, faculty, staff, and community. Many lives have been changed for the better as a result of their education at San Bernardino Valley College, Crafton Hills College, the Economic Development Corporate Training Center, and KVCR. We sincerely hope that our students continue their learning to enhance their skills, improve their employment opportunities, achieve their educational goals, and just have fun!

BUDGET SUMMARY

Balanced Budget

The budget is balanced utilizing revenues and fund balance to cover expenditures.

Integrated Planning and Budgeting

The colleges and the District Office have each used their program review and/or strategic planning processes to determine their highest priority goals and objectives. Consequently, the budget reflects resources allocated to departments based on those prioritized requirements, in an effort to match resources with the highest priority goals and objectives throughout the District.

State Budget Update

Current Year 2012 Deficit

In February, the Chancellor's Office had the regrettable duty to inform the California Community College (CCC) community that the first apportionment report (P1) showed a deficit of \$179 million, of which \$149 million was unanticipated (the other \$30 million was a statutory trigger cut).

Budget Year 2013 Deficit

The state continues to wrestle with a deficit heading into Budget Year 2013. The Governor identified the scope of the budget gap as having increased from \$9.2 billion identified in his January proposal to \$15.7 billion in his May revision. The following summarizes how the state has reached this point:

- Current year revenues were \$4.3 billion short of January estimates
- The Proposition 98 Guarantee has grown by \$2.4 billion over the 2-year period
- The federal government and court decisions have removed approximately \$1.7 billion in potential savings solutions

The Governor's May Revision proposes \$4.1 billion in new spending reductions, bringing the total proposed reductions to \$8.3 billion.

Education Highlights

<u>Proposition 98</u> – Proposition 98 grows to about \$54 billion in the Budget Year 2013, up from \$52.4 billion estimated in January. This results from the Governor merging his November tax initiative with the "Millionaire's Tax" initiative. The merged tax initiative would generate more revenue in the budget

year. Additionally, the Proposition 98 calculation is driven on year-over-year growth. So, diminished current year revenues make the year-over-year percentage change higher.

If the November initiative fails, K-14 education is slated for a trigger cut of nearly \$5.5 billion. The CCCs would lose the \$313M in deferral repayments and then take an additional base cut of approximately \$300 million. We note the Governor has not broken down the triggers between K-12 and the CCCs, so we are assuming an 11% share of the reduction. A base reduction of that magnitude would represent an approximate workload reduction of 6%. Clearly, this would be a devastating hit to the state's community colleges.

<u>California Community Colleges (CCCs)</u> – While there are still a number of assumptions and moving parts to sort through, the Governor does not make major changes to his January proposal for the CCCs. The increased growth of the Proposition 98 Guarantee (assuming successful passage of the November tax initiative) would continue to be used to buy down the cost of deferrals. Under the May Revision, \$313 million in deferrals would be bought down, while only \$218 million was proposed in January. Given the majority reductions absorbed in recent years, the Chancellor's Office for the California Community Colleges believes it is reasonable to request that any new money should go to supporting student services and adding back course sections.

The Governor continues to pursue his proposal to consolidate categorical funding and to revise the current FTES funding model, though the Chancellor's Office notes that the Legislature has shown little interest in these proposals. Similar to January, there is no proposal for growth, cost-of-living-adjustment (COLA), or increased funding for categorical programs.

The Governor proposes to fund the \$48 million SB 70 programmatic money through Proposition 98 in the Budget Year 2013. Generally, these funds, part of the QEIA agreement, have been funded outside of Proposition 98. This proposal would help save the state money in their budget for the portion that does not include Proposition 98.

The Governor also alters his mandates block grant reform proposal to include two newly adopted mandates and increase the funding per FTES to \$28. Total funding is \$33.4 million. Further, the Governor would eliminate the mandate claiming process, which would more or less force districts to participate in the block grant program (or file suit, perhaps...).

The Governor now anticipates \$116 million in current year property tax revenue, as opposed to the \$146.7 million estimated in January due to the dissolution of redevelopment agencies (RDAs). The Chancellor's Office remains concerned that these dollars will not materialize as estimated and that enacting the General Funds cuts may add to the current year deficit.

<u>Cal Grants</u> - The Governor maintains the \$311 million in cuts to Cal Grants that he proposed in January. The May Revision further proposes to restrict Cal Grant awards to institutions that graduate students at a rate of at least 30% and where default rates are below 15%. Our initial understanding is that this new proposal will not impact the CCCs.

Risks

Just as the January proposal included many risks, so does the May Revision. The Chancellor's Office remains concerned about the estimates of new property tax revenues that owe to the dissolution of

RDAs. The Chancellor's Office is also concerned about the lack of specificity of the triggers. The Governor does not specify the K12/CCC trigger split. Also unanswered is the impact of adding SB 70 funding to Proposition 98 – would those \$48 million need to be tacked on the trigger in order to make room within the guarantee? That has not yet been answered. Further, the May revise includes significant new reductions to Medi-Cal, IHSS, state employee compensation, and other areas. If the Legislature is unwilling to make some or all of these cuts, would they consider cuts in Proposition 98?

Of course, the biggest uncertainty remains the willingness of the voters to pass the November tax initiative. A recent poll showed the proposal passing at 54% of the vote. While a full campaign has not yet been run for the initiative, generally, successful ballot initiatives tend to start out with a higher level of support early on. Further, the Molly Munger initiative appears to have enough signatures to also make the ballot. Will competing initiatives split the support vote or turn off enough voters to kill the Governor's initiative? It's too early to say. It should further be noted that the Munger initiative would cancel out the Brown initiative if it receives a higher vote total, so CCCs could also be subject to trigger cuts in a scenario where the Brown initiative reaches 50% but receives less support than the Munger initiative.

Conclusion

The Governor chooses to spend the higher growth in the Prop 98 guarantee to pay down more deferrals. The Chancellor's Office does not believe that this is the best use of new dollars given the needs of the CCC districts, students, and the state. The Chancellor's Office will work with the State's administration and the Legislature to shift these funds back into program so districts can serve more students and serve them better.

Clearly, the CCC budgets look much better with the successful passage of Governor's initiative than without it. At this point, the Chancellor's Office does not recommend that districts assume that the November ballot initiative will pass. The outcome is too uncertain, and the repercussions of making drastic midyear cuts are too large. The Chancellor's Office strongly advises districts to budget very cautiously for the 2012-13 fiscal year.

Budget Assumptions

Given the status of the state budget, the District's budget includes the following assumptions:

- State funds enrollment of 12,665 full-time equivalent students (FTES).
- No cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) or additional funding for growth.
- 7% increase in health and welfare benefits.
- Deferral of \$750,000 of GASB 45 liability into fiscal year 2013.
- \$15.4 million deferral of state apportionment for budget year 2013 into fiscal year 2014.
- \$770,000 net contribution from the Crafton Hills College Solar Farm.
- \$500,000 decrease in KVCR General Fund support.

As an informational item to the San Bernardino Community College District Board of Trustees, this report is a summary of all construction change orders and amendments to date for projects at Crafton Hills and San Bernardino Valley Colleges, including those on today's Board agenda.

ANALYSIS

Current submitted construction contract amendments and change orders for currently awarded Measure M projects total \$16,082.00 which is 0.062% change of the overall project cost.

The analysis shows that construction contract change orders and amendments for currently awarded Measure M projects have been held to a minimal amount of \$1,019,497.49 which is only 3.94% of the project cost of \$25,902,121.45.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

The district's budget is a financial plan based on estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. Cash refers to what is <u>actually</u> in the district's treasury on a day-to-day and month-to-month basis. Monitoring the amount of cash available to meet the district's financial obligations is the core responsibility of the Fiscal Services Department.

The General Fund cash balance for the district as of May 31 was \$17,502,899. This includes interfund borrowing of \$10,000,000. This balance is sufficient to continue district operations through June 30, 2012.
