11. INSTITUTIONAL PRESENTATION - CURRICULUM UPDATE

Dr. Haragewen Kinde, Interim Vice President of Instruction, presented an overview of the curriculum committee and its function. Leticia Hector, faculty member, introduced the trustees to the course content review process for new courses or for current courses due in the review cycle. Courses are ultimately approved, recommended for modifications and approved, or denied approval. Approved courses are forwarded to the Board of Trustees.

Ms. Hector talked about Senate Bill 1440 which authorizes California community colleges to create associated degrees for transfer that would guarantee students admission into the CSU system. In response to SB 1440, the Academic Senate for CCC and CSU developed a faculty-led, statewide effort to identify the course content for new Associate Degrees for Transfer.

CurricuUNET is the electronic version of the approval process and was acquired by SBCCD in 2006. SBVC developed their unique curriculum management processes and further developed the system to maintain local repository and content.

Dr. Kinde talked about the credits that can be completed by taking on-line courses. SBVC currently has 20 certificate programs which can be completed on-line. Fifteen Associate Degrees can also be achieved on-line. Retention and success rate data of on-line courses was presented. Although the data confirms the retention and success rate of on-line classes is not as high as face-to-face classes, retention and success rates have improved.

Dr. Henry asked what the Board could do to help improve the success rate of online courses. Dr. Kuck said the Distance Education Council which is made up of faculty and administrators have been doing an analysis of the services we need to provide to on-line students. The DEC is actively looking to close the gap between on-line courses and face-to-face classes.

Ms. Ferracone said some students don't have any idea how to be successful in an on-line class. She would support a course that helps a student learn how to take an on-line course. Dr. Henry agreed, and added she would like to see these figures improve.

Mr. Zoumbos asked how the evaluations of on-line classes compare to evaluations of face-to-face classes. Dr. Kuck said the Tools Committee has developed forms for the different classroom environments. Mr. Zoumbos asked if an instructor is limited to the number of on-line courses. Dr. Kinde said most faculty who teach on-line have at least one face-to-face class.

Joseph Williams asked about the labor market and gainful employment criteria. Dr. Kinde responded the labor market information is looked at and advisory committee minutes are also reviewed. The definition of gainful employment is provided by the state, and it has been implemented in the curriculum process.

Dr. Singer asked what the college is doing about vocational classes which are no longer relevant. Dr. Kinde said that issue is part of the program review process and the emerging needs of our community. She said this dialogue also happens in advisory board meetings. Dr. Kuck said as part of the strategic planning process, we are actively engaging with the Inland Empire Economic Partnership (IEEP) to survey community and business leaders to determine their needs. The college is also engaging the K-12 and the university system to find out where the college fits. The campus is reaching out to local chambers. Mr. Williams suggested the Board take a look at the state's workforce board because they can be a good resource.

Dr. Cheryl Marshall, CHC President, focused on the external drivers, labor market demands and environmental scans that drive the college's curriculum, along with the internal modification that helps focus on student success, creating a well-rounded curriculum. The mission is to advance the education and success of students in a quality learning environment. The vision is to be the premiere community college for public safety and health careers and transfer preparation. Institutional values include creativity, inclusiveness, excellence and learning centeredness.

CHC is working to achieve successful course alignment which means better educational planning for students enrolled in SBVC and CHC. There is a demand from local high schools to provide on-site college courses and specialized programming. CHC and feeder high schools must work collaboratively to ensure alignment in English and math sequences.

In addition to working with chambers and local business groups, the college finds environmental scans to be useful in identifying trends in our service areas. The state chancellor's office and the Center of Excellence data are additional sources that can help make those decisions.

Rebeccah Warren-Marlatt, Interim Executive Vice President of Instruction and Student Services, talked about curriculum focal issues. The Transfer Model Curriculum is legislatively compelled. Each college is to adopt a goal of 80% of majors in which there is a TMC by Fall, 2013. The TMC applies to all 60-unit transfer majors. Each college is to have TMCs for 100% of its majors by Fall, 2014. Eleven TMCs have been approved and 5 more are pending state approval.

The course identification numbers system is concomitant with the TMC. Course identification numbers facilitate transfer and articulation of courses between CHC and other institutions and are required for approval of AA-T and AS-T by the state.

Course repeatability was discussed. Students can repeat courses when repetition is necessary to meet major requirements for CSU, US or a Bachelor's degree, for intercollegiate athletics (up to 4 times), and for intercollegiate academic or vocational competition (up to 4 times). Repeatability has been

removed from PE activity courses, fine arts courses, fire and EMS, respiratory and special topic courses.

Research indicates that basic skills students take too many units and take too long to finish. CHC has addressed this issue by rewriting entry level curriculum so students can reach their goal in three semesters rather than four semesters. This is called curricular compression. If the college's results align with the research, positive results are expected. Support services, such as supplemental instruction, are built into this compression process. The Left Lane Project is an example of integrating curriculum with support services.

Dr. Henry asked how CHC was planning to increase its success rate in online courses. Dr. Marshall said instructors have to get better at teaching on-line courses, and the college needs to do better screening of students. Ms. Warren-Marlatt said the college needs to look carefully at courses that they don't want to deliver on-line. Most on-line courses at CHC are capped at 35 students. Success rate is defined as a grade of C or better.

The college is taking a proactive stance in K-12 alignment by reaching out to its feeder schools. It is important to get CHC faculty together with K-12 faculty so they can work together on the curriculum.

New facilities impact instruction and the curriculum. CHC has 4 new buildings coming on in the next few years. Renovation projects will be moving forward, also. The college will end up with between 45-60 remodeled rooms and approximately 15 additional rooms with the projects.

Dr. Henry said the presentations were informative and thanked everyone for the information.

PROGRAM NAME CHANGE

The department of Physical Education (PE) is seeking to change its name to Kinesiology (KIN) to better represent the area of study we currently offer courses in, as well as the future courses, certificates and degrees we will offer.

Many of the larger community colleges, as well as 4-year institutions, have KIN departments and not PE (see below).

- Community Colleges: Mt. San Antonio, Citrus, Riverside, Pasadena, Antelope Valley, College of the Desert
- 4-year institutions: CSUSB, Cal Poly Pomona, Cal State Fullerton, Cal State Long Beach, Cal State Northridge

In addition, the department has met with the faculty chairs for the department of PE at Crafton Hills College. They are in agreement with this name change and are initiating this same change process at their campus.

As our department is currently in the process of creating a KIN TMC, researching potential certificates to offer, updating and creating new courses, now is the time to change our name to better reflect who we are. In addition, the change to KIN would give our department more credibility as well as allow us more freedom in adding new lines of study within the field.

The department has met and/or spoken with all of the full-time faculty members, both here and at Crafton Hills College, and everyone has agreed that the change to KIN is in the best interest of the department and the respective colleges.

The Curriculum Committee unanimously approved the change from Physical Education to Kinesiology.

NEW PREFIX

The Electrical/Electronic Department offers one class in OSHA 30 hour Construction Training (ELEC 090). The department is planning to create and offer more OSHA classes, specifically:

- OSHA 30 HOUR GENERAL INDUSTRY
- OSHA 10 HOUR CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY
- OSHA 10 HOUR GENERAL INDUSTRY

In addition to the students enrolled in the Electronics program, students enrolled in other programs such as Water Supply Technology, Automotive Technology, Welding, and Inspection would find one or more OSHA classes useful for their career. It would be much easier for students to locate the OSHA class if it is listed as OSHA in the schedule and catalog than if it is listed as ELEC.

The division dean, faculty chair, full-time and part-time faculty have met to discuss the proposed new prefix and all are in agreement that this new prefix will benefit students.

The Curriculum Committee unanimously approved the prefix of OSHA.

MODIFY DEGREE

Geology A.S. Degree Major

Required Courses:

The Geology Associate of Science Degree equips students with a comprehensive understanding of the Earth's history, structure, economic resources, climate, and environment. This degree program meets student needs for: (1) transfer into a geological, environmental, or Earth sciences program at a four-year institution, (2) preparing for a career within the geological sciences or related fields, including energy exploration and development, environmental protection and remediation, hydrology, meteorology, hazard analysis and mitigation, and secondary and higher education, (3) fulfilling the undergraduate general education science requirement, and (4) a better understanding of the integration of natural systems with human-environment interactions within and upon the Earth.

Students who wish to pursue a degree in geology should take GEOL 101 and 111 before enrolling in additional geology courses. OVERVIEW

The Aquatics Director is responsible for the daily operation, planning, organization, and administration of the Crafton Hills College Aquatics Center. The Emergency Preparedness Manager oversees, coordinates, develops, implements, promotes, evaluates and manages the District's disaster, emergency preparedness and response program and activities. The Director, Fiscal Services, directs, manages, supervises and coordinates assigned activities and operations of the Fiscal Services Department.

ANALYSIS

The revised job descriptions will provide a clear and more defined clarification for the positions and meet the needs of the campus and District.

AQUATICS DIRECTOR

Class specifications are intended to present a descriptive list of the range of duties performed by employees in the class. Specifications are <u>not</u> intended to reflect all duties performed within the job; however, any additional duties will be reasonably related to this class.

SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

Under the general direction of the Vice President of Administrative Services, the Aquatics Director is responsible for the daily operation, planning, organization, and administration of the Crafton Hills College Aquatics Center.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

The following duties are typical for this classification.

- 1. Plans, directs, supervises and assumes primary responsibility for the safe and efficient conduct of all events in the Aquatics Center.
- 2. Develop, implement, and market aquatic programming, which may include: swimming lessons, competitions, private lessons, arthritis aquatics, water fitness, lifeguard classes, special events, and the summer activity.
- 3. Manage and maintain required training for Aquatics Center staff.
- 4. Supervises aquatic staff including pool attendants, lifeguards, seasonal employees, maintenance staff and volunteers.
- 5. Plans and organizes workloads and staff assignments.
- 6. Selects, trains, motivates and evaluates assigned staff; reviews progress and directs changes as needed.
- 7. Directs the patrolling of the pool and the enforcement of safety rules and regulations.
- 8. Develop, maintain, revise, and enforce pool policies and procedures.
- 9. Provides leadership and direction in the development of short and long range plans. Gathers, interprets, and prepares data for studies, reports and recommendations.
- 10. Assures that assigned areas of responsibility are performed within budget, and performs cost control activities.
- 11. Monitors revenues and expenditures in assigned area to assure sound fiscal control and prepares annual budget requests.
- 12. Assures effective and efficient use of budgeted funds, personnel, materials, facilities, and time.
- 13. Researches, plans and implements fee structures for aquatic facilities.
- 14. Plans, develops and implements aquatic programs and coordinates staff in the implementation of the programs.
- 15. Prepares for publication a variety of brochures, calendars, letters, posters, news releases, flyers, and related communications promoting aquatic programs and facilities.
- 16. Reviews existing aquatic programs and revises or changes programs as needed.

- 17. Approves the scheduling of all aquatic activities in accordance with the District Civic Center Policy through the Facilities Use office.
- 18. Responds to public inquiries about aquatics programs made by telephone, correspondence, or during public meetings.
- 19. Promotes interest and provides information regarding aquatics programs to District and campus administration and management, community organizations, community service groups, other departments, and the general public.
- 20. Assures the facility is in compliance with local, state, and federal regulations.
- 21. Collect and provide statistical data related to aquatics and facilities.
- 22. Develop and implement the master pool schedule with campus departments and community users of the aquatics facilities.
- 23. Oversee daily physical operation of the pool, including pool chemistry, maintenance, pool cleaning and chemical purchases.
- 24. Maintain regular communication with Maintenance and Operations regarding mechanical issues and cleaning of the facility.
- 25. Spend time on pool deck as necessary (i.e. fill in for pool attendants, during large events, etc.).
- 26. Develop, maintain, and improve aquatics portion of the CHC website in collaboration with web development staff.
- 27. Oversee the scheduling of lifeguards, aquatic staff, and facility supervisors as necessary.
- 28. Work cooperatively with college departmental user groups, clubs, local municipalities, and community organizations to logistically schedule the pool facility.
- 29. Inform appropriate parties of rental groups, special events, etc. Coordinate such activities as required.

Under the direction of the Chief of Police, the Emergency Preparedness Manager oversees, coordinates, develops, implements, promotes, evaluates and manages the District's disaster, emergency preparedness and response program and activities. This position works closely with the District's Environmental Health & Safety Administrator and Campus/District Safety Officers. The Emergency Preparedness Manager provides leadership, expertise and professional consultation to the District in all phases of emergency management, which includes mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery.

REPRESENTATIVE DUTIES

OVERVIEW

Construction change orders may be generated by a number of circumstances. These include changes directed by the District to address contractor or architect recommendations for efficiency, occupant needs, or to improve future building or space usability. California Public Contract Code 20118.4 establishes a guideline that limits construction contract change orders to 10% of the base contract amount.

A construction contract is amended when there is a change in the scope of work due to unforeseen conditions that must be corrected in order for work to proceed. Amendments alter the base contract amount and are not limited to the 10% guideline.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

<u>ANALYSIS</u>

Construction contract amendments and change orders submitted with this board item total \$104,670.00 which is 0.287% of the total Measure M construction contracts of \$36,517,897.45.

The total of all Measure M amendments and change orders, including those submitted this month, increases the Bond Measure M construction contracts by \$1,501,936.25. The new overall Measure M change order percentage is 4.11%. The cost of these changes will be absorbed by bid savings; the construction projects remain within the approved budget.

OVERVIEW

Construction change orders may be generated by a number of circumstances. These include changes directed by the District to address contractor or architect recommendations for efficiency, occupant needs, or to improve future building or space usability. California Public Contract Code 20118.4 establishes a guideline that limits construction contract change orders to 10% of the base contract amount.

A construction contract is amended when there is a change in the scope of work due to unforeseen conditions that must be corrected in order for work to proceed. Amendments alter the base contract amount and are not limited to the 10% guideline.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

ANALYSIS

Construction contract amendments and change orders submitted with this board item total \$16,693.82 which is 0.016% of the total Measure P construction contracts of \$107,107,566.19.

The total of all Measure P amendments and change orders, including those submitted this month, increases the Bond Measure P construction contracts by \$6,316,768.33. The new overall Measure P change order percentage is 5.90%. The cost of these changes will be absorbed by bid savings; the construction projects remain within the approved budget.

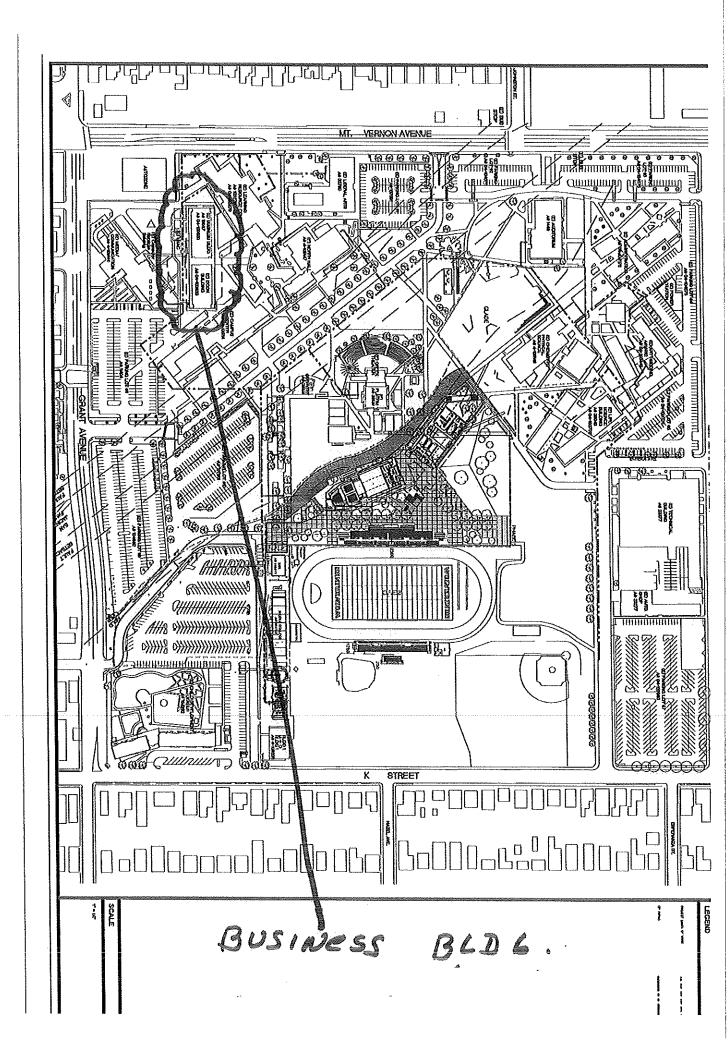

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve an income contract with Pepsi Beverages Company for exclusive beverage rights and sponsorship of SBVC and CHC programs in the amount of \$287,500 plus commissions and rebates of approximately \$125,000.

OVERVIEW

The District consolidated beverage rights and sponsorships of campus programs in 2008 through a public RFP process resulting in an increase of \$165,000 in unrestricted revenue for the campuses. The current five-year income contract expires on March 31, 2013.

ANALYSIS

The District advertised RFP 2013-01 for exclusive beverage rights and sponsorship of campus programs. A committee of campus and district representatives evaluated the responses and recommended award to Pepsi Beverages Company. Pepsi Beverages Company's proposal offers an increase in considerations, commissions, and rebates to the District of approximately \$32,500 over the previous contract. The resulting five-year income contract provides additional student scholarships and unrestricted revenue while granting Pepsi Beverages Company exclusive sponsorship rights at SBVC and CHC.

RECOMMENDATION

This item is for information only and no action is required.

OVERVIEW

As an informational item to the San Bernardino Community College District Board of Trustees, this report is a summary of all construction change orders and amendments to date for projects at Crafton Hills and San Bernardino Valley Colleges, including those on today's Board agenda.

ANALYSIS

Current submitted construction contract amendments and change orders for currently awarded Measure P projects total \$16,693.82 which is 0.016% change of the overall project cost.

The analysis shows that construction contract change orders and amendments for currently awarded Measure P projects have been held to a minimal amount of \$6,316,768.33 which is only 5.90% of the project cost of \$107,107,566.19.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

OVERVIEW

The District's budget is a financial plan based on estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. Cash refers to what is actually in the District's treasury on a day-to-day and month-to-month basis. Monitoring the amount of cash available to meet the District's financial obligations is the core responsibility of the Fiscal Services Department.

Attached is the General Fund monthly cash flow analysis for the District. The General Fund cash balance as of February 28, 2013 is \$14,833,047. It includes a \$4,975,000 constitutional advance, which is scheduled to be repaid this April.

<u>ANALYSIS</u>

The District's cash balance is sufficient to continue operations through June 30, 2013.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

A. General

In order to merit the respect and confidence of the public trust, the District is governed by the highest ideals of honesty and integrity in all public and personal relationships. Personal profit or any benefit obtained through misuse of public or personal relationships is dishonest and will not be tolerated. District faculty and staff should at no time, or under any circumstances, accept directly or indirectly, any form of gift, gratuity, honorarium, loan, favors or service, entertainment, prejudicial discounts, preferential treatment or other things of value or benefit, which might influence or appear to influence any business or operation of the District.

Outside professional, private financial interests or arrangements, or the receipt of benefits from third parties can create an actual or perceived appearance of impropriety. District faculty and staff must at all times avoid the appearance of unethical or compromising practices in relationships, actions and communications. In order to maintain the highest standard of ethical conduct, District faculty and staff with other professional or financial interests shall disclose them in compliance with applicable conflict of interest/conflict of commitment policies, and shall not engage in any activity or transaction which is in violation of those policies. It is the responsibility of each District faculty and staff member to remain free of financial interests and activities which are, or could be, detrimental or in conflict with the best interests of the District.

B. Designated Employees

Persons holding positions listed below are considered designated employees. It has been determined that these persons make or participate in the making of decisions which may have a foreseeable material effect on financial interest.

The Chancellor may determine in writing that a particular consultant, although a "designated person," is hired to perform a range of duties that are limited in scope and thus is not required to comply with the disclosure requirements of one or more categories. Such determination shall include a description of the consultant's duties and, based upon that description, a statement of the extent of disclosure requirements. The Chancellor determination is public record and shall be retained for public inspection in the same manner and location as this conflict of interest code. (Gov. Code 81008). Nothing herein excuses any such consultant from any other provisions of the Conflict of Interest Code.

C. Disclosure Categories

Category 1

All investments and business positions and sources of income from business (including gifts, loans, and travel payments), and interests in real property.

Category 2

Investments and business positions in business entities, and sources of income (including gifts, loans, and travel payments) of the type which contract with the San Bernardino Community College District to provide services, supplies, materials, machinery or equipment utilized by the District.

Category 3

Investments and business positions in business entities (including gifts, loans, and travel payments) of the type which contract with the designated position's department to provide services, supplies, materials, machinery or equipment utilized by the department.

Category 4

All investments and business positions in, and sources of income (including gifts, and travel payments) from a business entity or nonprofit organization, if the source is of the type to receive grants or other monies from or through the San Bernardino Community College District.

D. Gifts and Honoraria

1. Gifts

No member of the Board or Designated Employee shall accept gifts with a total value of more than \$390.00 in a calendar year from any single source, if the member or employee would be required to report the receipt of income or gifts from that source on his or her statement of economic interests.

2. Honoraria

For purposes of the application of this section, an honorarium is a payment received for making a speech, publishing an article, or attending any public or private conference, convention, meeting, social event, meal or similar gathering. If the member or employee would be required to report the receipt of income or gifts from that source on his or her statement of economic interests no member of the Board or Designated Employee shall accept any honorarium from any source.
