Theatre Arts AA-T Transfer Degree, AA-T

The Associate of Arts for Transfer (AA-T) in Theatre Arts develops a well-rounded theatre artist through the Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act (SB 1440). The law states that students will have guaranteed admission to a California State University (CSU) campus upon successful completion of the specified program requirements. This degree provides students with transfer preparation and pre-professional training. The AA-T in Theatre Arts emphasizes the hands-on, collaborative experience of theatrical production, building students' skills in performance and technical theatre. Students should consult with a counselor to determine whether this degree is the best option for their transfer goals.

The Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act (Senate Bill 1440, now codified in California Education Code sections 66746-66749) guarantees admission to a California State University (CSU) campus for any community college student who completes an "associate degree for transfer", a newly established variation of the associate degrees traditionally offered at a California community college. The Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or the Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) is intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree in a similar major at a CSU campus. Students completing these degrees (AA-T or AS-T) are guaranteed admission to the CSU system, but not to a particular campus or major. In order to earn one of these degrees, students must complete 60 required semester units of CSU-transferable coursework with a minimum GPA of 2.0. Students transferring to a CSU campus that does accept the AA-T or AS-T will be required to complete no more than 60 units after transfer to earn a bachelor's degree (unless the major is a designated "high unit" major). This degree may not be the best option for students intending to transfer to a particular CSU campus or to a university or college that is not part of the CSU system. Students should consult with a counselor when planning to complete the degree for more information on university admission and transfer requirements.

To earn this AA-T degree, students must complete the following Associate Degree for Transfer requirements:

•completion of the following major requirements with grades of C or better;

completion of a minimum of 60 CSU transferable semester units with a grade point average of at least 2.0; and
 certified completion of the CSU General Education-Breadth (CSUGE) or Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC)

for CSU, which requires a minimum of 39 units.

It is highly recommended that students complete courses that satisfy the U.S. History, Constitution, and American Ideals requirement as part of CSUGE or IGETC before transferring to a CSU.

Students planning to transfer to a baccalaureate institution and major in Theatre should consult with a counselor regarding the transfer process and lower division requirements.

Environmental Science A.S. Degree Major

The goals of the Environmental Science program are to: 1) meet the needs of students who are majoring in one of the diverse fields encompassed by environmental science, and 2) provide options for students fulfilling general education science requirements.

Awareness of the issues of environmental quality is increasingly important in business, industry, and government. The growing human population and increasing consumption of resources are creating unprecedented pressures on our planetary life support systems. Environmental science majors need to complete an interdisciplinary set of core requirements that provide a basic understanding of the physical, biological, and social sciences and the relevance of these sciences to environmental processes and issues. In addition, the coursework will prepare students for related baccalaureate majors, including: biology, chemistry, engineering, geography (including emphasis in geographic information systems (GIS)), geology, mathematics, oceanography, and physics. For non-majors, the program's goal is to educate students to make better-informed choices about key environmental and health issues.

Students planning to transfer to a four-year institution and major in environmental science should consult with a counselor regarding the transfer process and institution-specific lower-division requirements. In upper division and graduate studies, students majoring in environmental science usually specialize in areas such as environmental toxicology, public health, environmental law, education, environmental economics, soil and water science, restoration ecology, environmental landscaping, environmental management and urban planning, and related careers.

To graduate with a specialization in Environmental Science, students must complete the following required courses plus the general breadth requirements for the Associate Degree (total = 60 units).

OVERVIEW

The California Voting Rights Act requires all local governments, including community colleges, to evaluate their current election processes. The release of new census data and the significant population changes over the past decade warranted consideration of the District's election processes. At its August 8, September 12, and October 29 meetings, the Board of Trustees received public comment on three proposed redistricting options.

ANALYSIS

The CCLC conducted an analysis of district demographics and voter turnout patterns following the requirements of the California and Federal Voting Rights Acts, which warranted a change in election processes. The CCLC provided three redistricting options to the Board for consideration.

OVERVIEW

The San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) supports a single fee structure for the California Community Colleges, particularly those, like SBCCD, which are located in economically depressed communities and whose students may not have the resources to take advantage of the opportunities a two-tier system might make available.

ANALYSIS

AB955 provides a two-tier enrollment fee structure that is designed to provide students with the opportunity to take courses in otherwise impacted program areas. At this time, the program is strictly voluntary and experimental. The students and community members have voiced strong concerns about the possible participation of the SBCCD in that program. Other districts will be participating in the program and the SBCCD Board can track their results, using that data to consider at a later time whether the benefits to our students would be significant enough to justify participation, after consultation with the community.

RESOLUTION ADOPT RESOLUTION TO ABSTAIN FROM CURRENT ACTION IMPLEMENTING AB 955 DECEMBER 2013

WHEREAS, The San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) actively supports the California Educational Master Plan, established on the principles of universal access and choice, and

WHEREAS, the principle of universal access has been implemented in the California Community Colleges and the SBCCD through the single-fee structure for enrollment fees,

WHEREAS, the California legislature has passed and the Governor has signed Assembly Bill 955 which would, until January 1, 2018, authorize community college districts to establish and maintain extension programs meeting specified characteristics at specified community college campuses during summer and winter intersessions, and the governing board of an eligible community college district may charge students enrolled in an extension course a fee that covers the actual cost of the course and that is based upon the district's nonresident fee rate for the year the course is offered.

WHEREAS, the Board of the SBCCD acknowledges the law and the eligibility of Crafton Hills College to participate in the pilot program, and

WHEREAS, the Board supports the legislature's attempt to resolve the issues generated by long-term budget cuts to the community colleges resulting in long-pent-up demand, the Board does not support the two-tier fee structure incorporated into this legislation, and recognizes that it sets the wrong tone for a community hard-hit by the recession and whose students may not have the resources to participate in higher-priced courses, and

WHEREAS, there are other California Community College Districts that will be participating in the pilot program whose implementation results can be followed by the SBCCD, and if those results are positive, upon appropriate consultation with and input from the community, students and shared governance groups, the SBCCD can reconsider participation at a later date.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the recommendation of the District's external auditors, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees forgive the \$1,815,000 and \$445,440 loans made to KVCR. The loans would be reclassified as permanent transfers and reduce the District's General Fund by \$2,260,440.

OVERVIEW

By fiscal year 2003-04 the District had loaned KVCR \$1,815,000, at 0% interest, to pay for the digital conversion of the radio and television stations. The amended terms of that loan provided for no payments to the District until April 2011. In May of 2011, 2012, and 2013, the Board amended the terms of the loan to allow an additional year until the first payment would be due. Based on the amended terms of the agreement, repayment of the loan would begin in May 2014 and continue for the next five years.

In fiscal year 2007-08 the District loaned KVCR \$445,440 for broadcast equipment. The loan was categorized as an inter-fund loan from the District's General Fund and no specific repayment terms were documented. No payments have been made as of this date.

KVCR is currently positioning itself to be financially independent so as to reduce the operational costs of KVCR charged to the District's General Fund.

ANALYSIS

The District provided the financial support in 2004 and 2008 based on the hope that, after several years, KVCR would be operating at a level that would allow repayment. While their repositioning plan is encouraging, current forecasts indicate it is unrealistic to expect KVCR to both achieve financial independence and also repay the loans in the foreseeable future.

The District's external auditors have issued a letter indicating they believe repayment is doubtful. They have been very clear that, as a result, Ed. Code (California Community Colleges "Budget and Accounting Manual" p. 4-39) does not permit the District to classify the transfers as loans. The auditors are requiring reclassification in the 2012-13 financial statements as

permanent transfers and a reduction of the General Fund. Failure to adopt this requirement will assure an audit finding and possibly a qualified audit opinion.

All of the funding from the District's General Fund in support of KVCR covers staffing and benefits. In an effort to relieve some of the fiscal pressure on the General Fund and the campuses, the Chancellor and KVCR General Manager have elected to direct funds that would have been used to make payments on the loans to cover the costs of six District-funded staff members and any additional jobs within the KVCR structure. The Chancellor and the General Manager do not feel that, based on current forecasts, KVCR is in a position to cover these costs and also repay the loans. Therefore, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees forgive the loans so that KVCR can focus on operational changes that will help them achieve financial independence.

Dear Mr. Strong and Associates,

In response to our discussion on Thursday, 10/31/2013, I wanted to provide you with some information regarding a community college district's ability for borrowing from one or more funds to another fund. Education Code §84030 authorizes the Board of Governors to establish and publish procedures to record the financial activity for community colleges in the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual (BAM). Chapter 4 of the BAM states that:

It should be noted that cash held in any fund may be available for temporary (less than one year) borrowing from one or more funds to another fund to be used for the payment of obligations, provided no provisions to the contrary exist. Such borrowings are not reported as a transfer, but are reflected in the balance sheet accounts "Due to Other Funds" and "Due from Other Funds."

During our audit of KVCR for the 2012-13 fiscal year, we have not been able to obtain support evidencing KVCR's ability to repay its borrowings from the District in less than one year. As a result, due to the statutory guidance from the BAM we believe the current intefund borrowing from the District to KVCR is unallowable under the classification of a temporary borrowing "due to/from." We recommend that the District reclassify any current due to/from that will not be repaid in less than one year as a permanent transfer to ensure compliance with the requirements set forth through Education Code §84030 and the BAM.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve a one-time budget adjustment of \$270,000 to fund additional Fiscal Year 2013-14 credit course offerings.

OVERVIEW

As part of Proposition 30, the District was funded for an enrollment growth increase of 2.26% – 298 FTES. On September 12, 2013, the Board of Trustees authorized funding for an additional 270 credit FTES for FY 2013-14, increasing the enrollment target to 13,759 credit Full Time Equivalent Students (FTES), of which 13,489 credit FTES are funded per the State Advance Apportionment allocation. Based on the most current information provided by the California Community College Chancellor's Office, it is recommended that the District further increase its target enrollment by an additional 270 credit FTES, representing two percent (2%) of Advance Apportionment credit FTES, and raising the credit FTES target to 14,029.

ANALYSIS

As part of the District's growth plan, an additional 270 FTES above the funded base are planned for 2013-14. Funding for additional adjunct faculty is estimated at \$1,000 per FTES. Upon approval, \$270,000 will be transferred from District Unrestricted Reserves as follows:

- \$189,000 (189 FTES) to San Bernardino Valley College, and
- \$ 81,000 (81 FTES) to Crafton Hills College.

NARRATIVE:

With the final FF&E and AV/IT designs complete the documents were given to the A/E team for coordination. 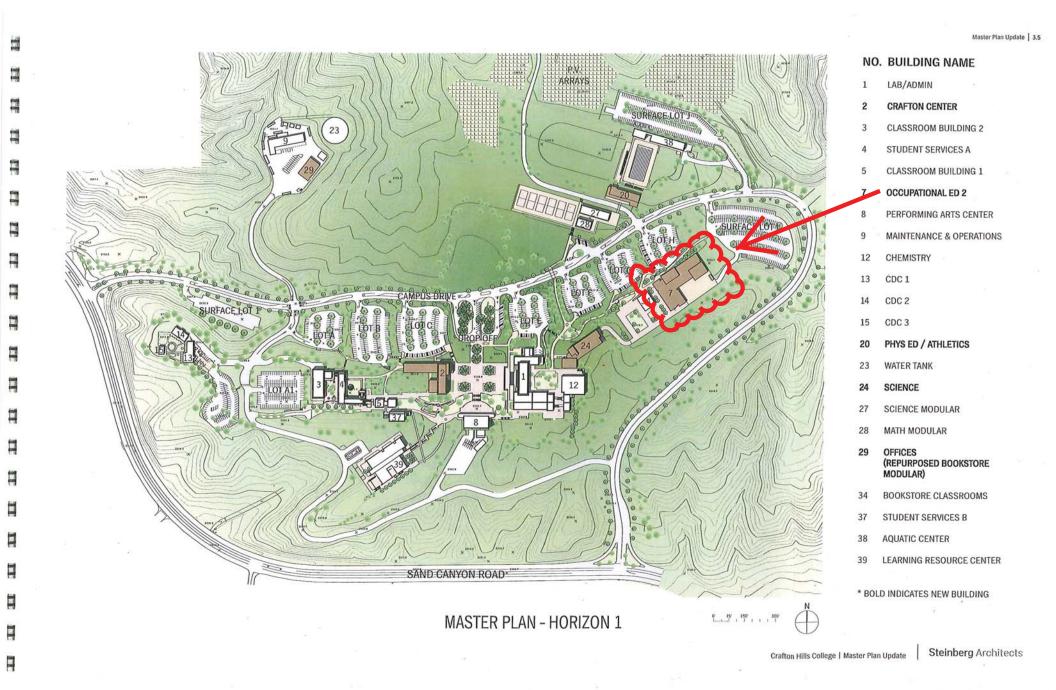

OVERVIEW

Construction change orders may be generated by a number of circumstances. These include changes directed by the District to address contractor or architect recommendations for efficiency, occupant needs, or to improve future building or space usability. California Public Contract Code 20118.4 establishes a guideline that limits construction contract change orders to 10% of the base contract amount.

A construction contract is amended when there is a change in the scope of work due to unforeseen conditions that must be corrected in order for work to proceed. Amendments alter the base contract amount and are not limited to the 10% guideline.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.

ANALYSIS

Construction contract amendments and change orders submitted with this board item total \$57,588.00 which is 0.084% of the total Measure M construction contracts of \$68,437,780.45.

The total of all Measure M amendments and change orders, including those submitted at this board meeting, increases the Bond Measure M construction contracts by \$2,020,240.83. The new overall Measure M change order percentage is 3.04%. The cost of these changes will be absorbed by bid savings; the construction projects remain within the approved budget.

Kitchell/BRj is pleased to provide this analysis of the bid results for the Crafton Hills College - OE2 Building project.

Bids were accepted until 1:00 PM on November 19, 2013. Upon closing of the bid period, the contractor proposals were opened and publicly read aloud at the San Bernardino Community College District Office, Board Room (PDC 104) located at 114 S. Del Rosa Drive in San Bernardino, CA. Eight (8) plan holders submitted bids for this project.

The lowest responsible bidder was determined to be Sinanian Development, Inc. in the total amount of \$15,888,000.00. This was determined as follows:

- Based on the language that was included in the contract documents Sinanian Development, Inc. was determined to be the apparent low bidder with their base bid amount, \$15,488,000.00, being the lowest bid price that was less than, or equal to, the funding amount that was publicly disclosed prior to the first bid being opened which was \$16,169,929.41.
- 2) Review and verification that their bid was responsive. Details of the analysis are below.
- SBCCD and CHC's decision and direction to proceed with the Contractor and Subcontractor's insurance costs of \$400,000.00 as listed within Sinanian Development, Inc.'s bid proposal/form versus the use of OCIP.

All of these items were reviewed and acknowledged with Sinanian Development, Inc. during the post-bid interview. A follow up letter was received from Sinanian Development, Inc. in which clarification was provided to all three of these items. Of the items it is important to note that Sinanian Development, Inc. will ensure that Diamond Bar Constructor's California License will be active prior to them stating any work on the project and in the event it remains inactive, Sinanian Development, Inc. will request for a subcontractor substitution approval from SBCCD pursuant to the provisions set forth in CA Public Contract Code Section 4107.

Per the specification section 002000 Instruction to Bidders, "The DISTRICT reserves the right to reject any or all bids, or to waive any irregularities or informalities in any bids or in the bidding." Based on this, Kitchell/BRj recommends waiving these minor irregularities.

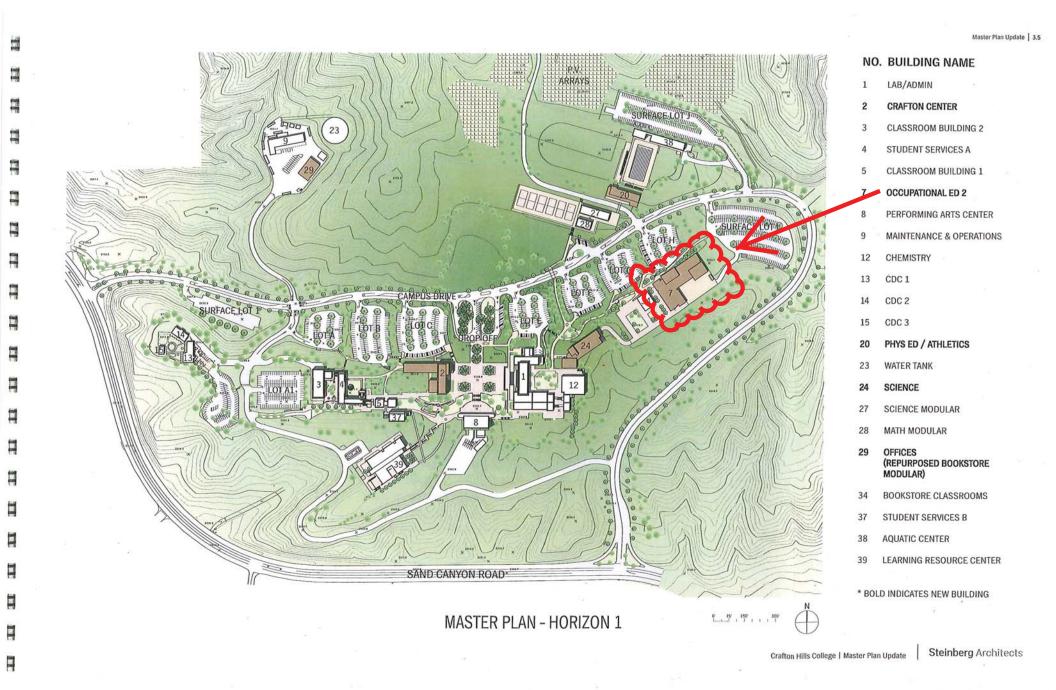

Kitchell/BRj is pleased to provide this analysis of the bid results for the Crafton Hills College - New Science Building project.

Bids were accepted until 1:00 PM on October 16, 2013. Upon closing of the bid period, the contractor proposals were opened and publicly read aloud at the San Bernardino Community College District Office, Board Room (PDC 104) located at 114 S. Del Rosa Drive in San Bernardino, CA. Nine (9) plan holders submitted bids for this project. The lowest responsible bidder was determined to be The O.K. Earl Corporation dba Earl Corporation with a base bid amount of \$18,272,531.00.

The bid selection criterion was developed by District's legal consulting to provide a competitive environment that meets the public contract code. The lowest bid shall be determined as follows:

(1) by adding the base price to the aggregate price for the first seven alternates identified above, provided that when added together, the total bid amount is less than, or equal to, a funding amount publicly disclosed by the DISTRICT before the first bid is opened; or

(2) If no base bid price when added to the first 7 alternates provides a total bid amount that is equal to or less than the funding amount publicly disclosed by the DISTRICT before the first bid is opened, then, the lowest bid will be determined by taking the base bid price and adding thereto as many of the alternates (from #1 thru #7) that will allow the District to receive the greatest scope of work at a total bid amount that is equal to or under the funding amount publicly disclosed by the DISTRICT before the first bid is opened; or

(3) If a low bid cannot be determined under (1) or (2) above, then the lowest bid will be determined by taking the base bid prices only.

The lowest bid shall be determined in a manner that prevents any information that would identify any of the bidders or proposed subcontractors or suppliers from being revealed to the public entity before the ranking of all bidders from lowest to highest has been determined.

A responsible bidder who submitted the lowest bid as determined by this section shall be the low bidder for determination of award of contract. This section does not preclude the DISTRICT from adding to or deducting from the contract any of the additive or deductive items after the lowest responsible bidder has been determined.

Bid add alternate no. 08, Contractor and Subcontractors provided insurance coverage(s) was not considered in the basis of selection criteria

Before opening the bid on October 16, 2013 at 1:00 PM, Kitchell/BRj announced the available construction fund for the project which was: \$17,176,728.68.

Since the low bid was higher than the available construction fund, option no. 3 becomes the basis for determination of low bidder, base bid price only. Therefore, the O.K. Earl Corporation dba Earl Corporation is determined to be the lowest responsible and responsive bidder, with base bid amount of \$18,272,531.00.

After reviewing the contractor and subcontractors provided insurance price vs. OCIP price, the District has decided to utilize the contractor and subcontractors provided insurance price of \$300,600, which is added to the base bid amount for a total contract amount of \$18,573,131.

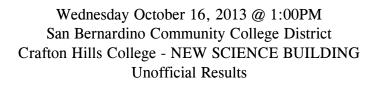

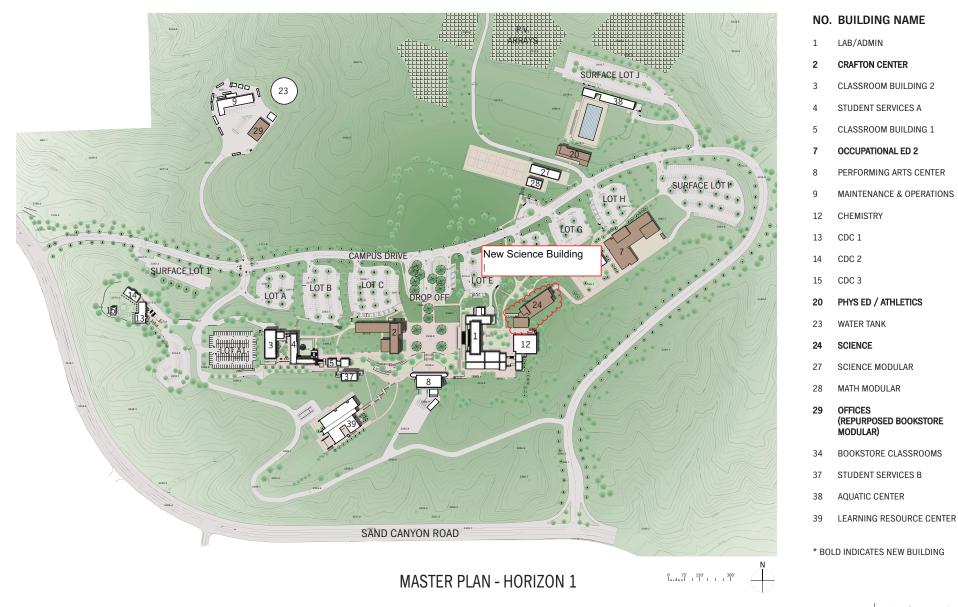

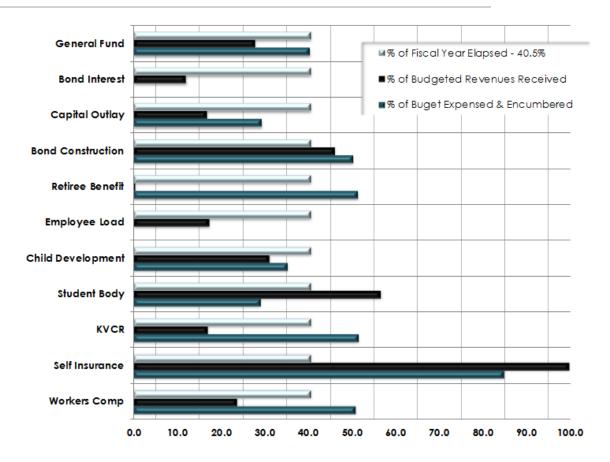

OVERVIEW

As an informational item to the San Bernardino Community College District Board of Trustees, this report is a summary of all construction change orders and amendments to date for projects at Crafton Hills and San Bernardino Valley Colleges, including those on today's Board agenda.

ANALYSIS

Current submitted construction contract amendments and change orders for currently awarded Measure M projects total \$57,588.00 which is 0.084% change of the overall project cost.

The analysis shows that construction contract change orders and amendments for currently awarded Measure M projects have been held to a minimal amount of \$2,077,828.83 which is only 3.04% of the project cost of \$68,437,780.45.

All change orders and amendments are approved following a specific process of review by the construction manager, architect, program/project managers, and District staff. Nonessential changes are rejected and never receive approval. Any changes determined to be essential to the health of the project and of major benefit to the District are approved and implemented.
