Three Peaks Challenge: Food, Fun & Family Services

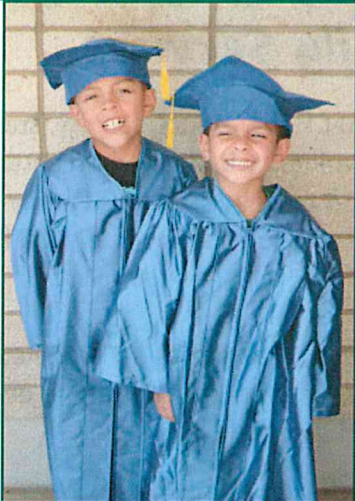

Foundation Invites Friends to Campus

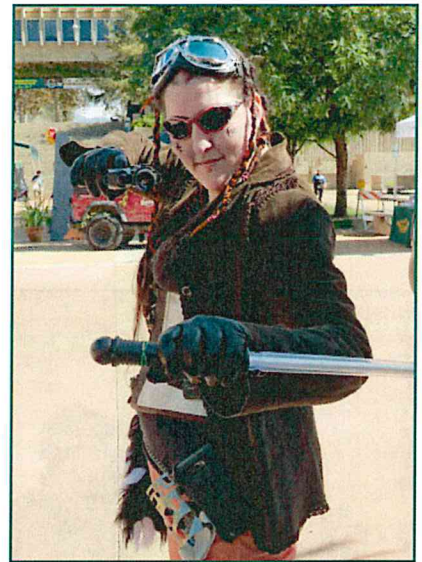

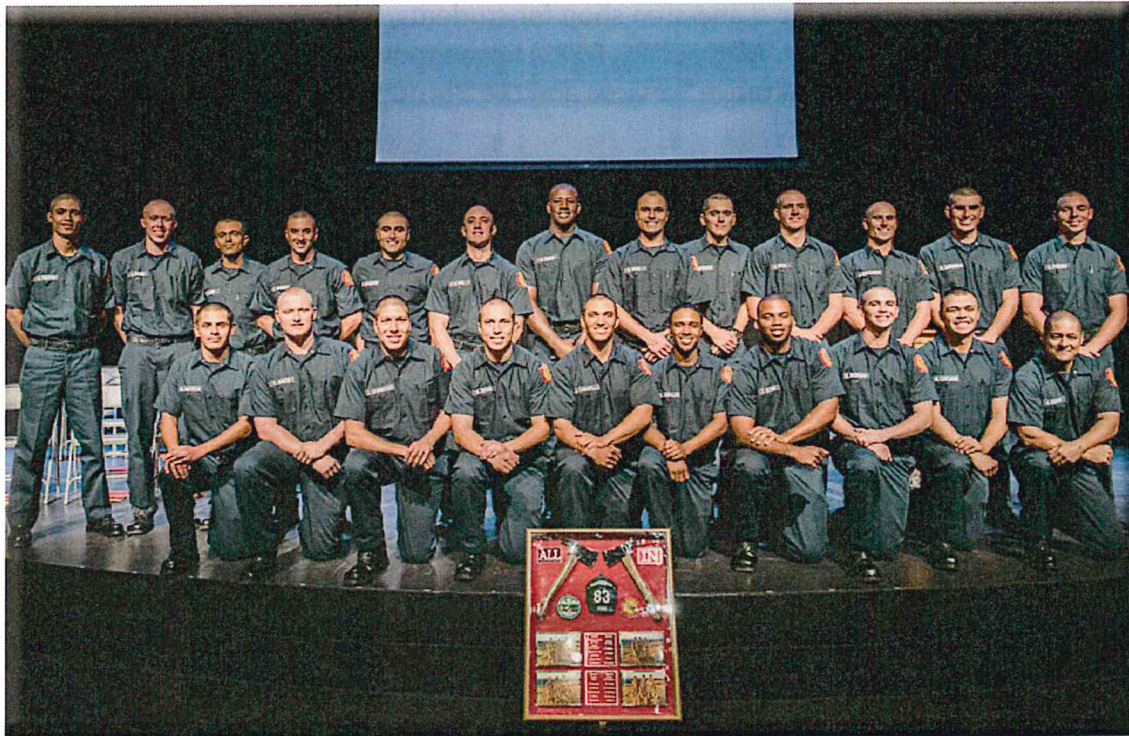
Club Rush 2015!

Fire Academy Graduates 83rd Class

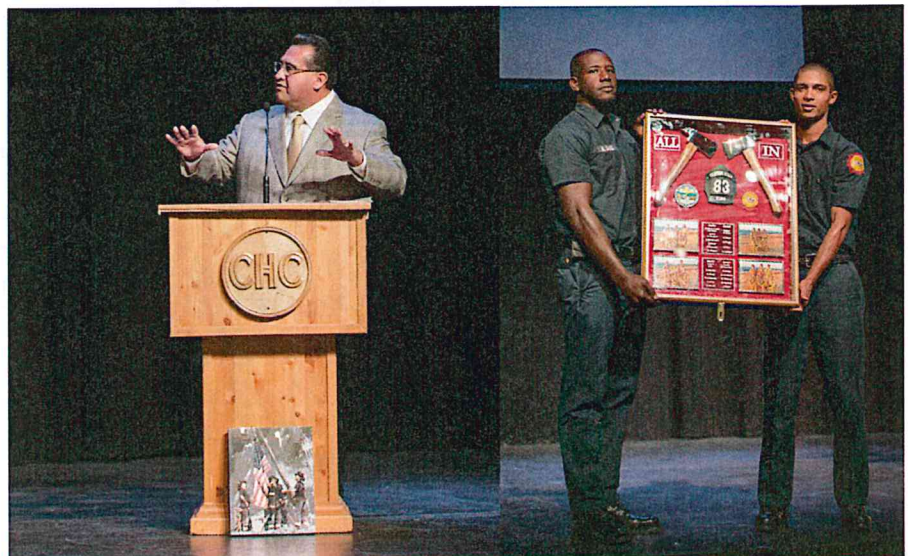


83rd Fire Academy Class

Senator Mike Morrell (R-23rd District) and Supervisor James Ramos attended the special event and extended their congratulations to the graduates.

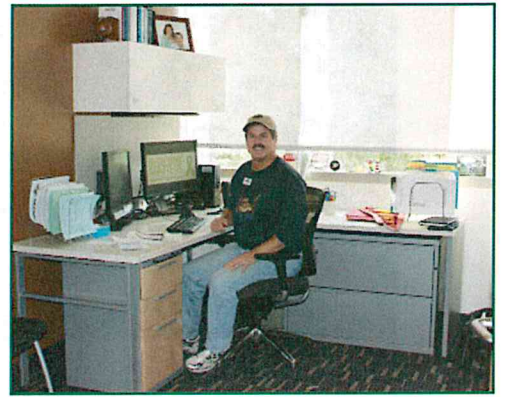


Crafton Center Slowly Opening for Services

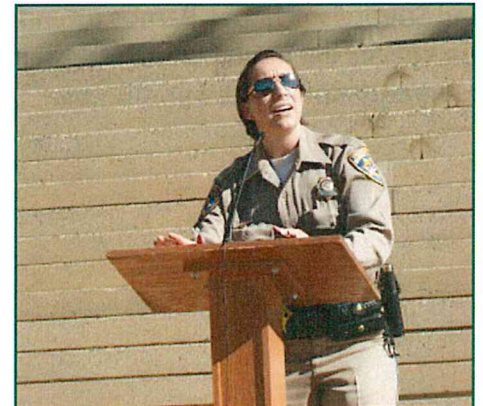

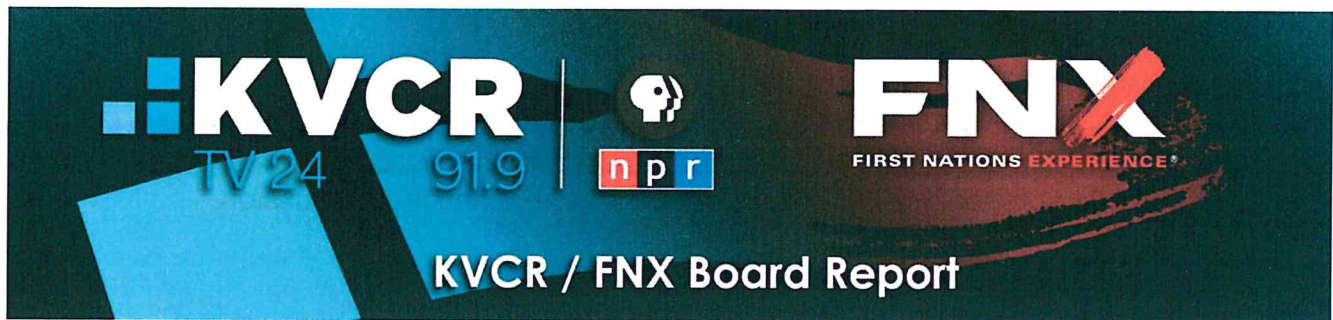
A grand opening will be scheduled for January 2016.

- **FEEDING AMERICA** – Once again, 91.9 KVCR will partner with Feeding America during our End Of Calendar Year Fundraiser in December. For one full day during the drive, our pledge pitch team will promote feeding families with the small amount of each donor’s pledge which would normally be spent to purchase a pledge thank you gift. The “Feed a Family” option will provide meals for hungry Inland Empire families while donors forego receiving a tote bag or another thank you gift. We are hoping for success as we end the calendar year and hope to find some support from board members.
- **KVC_aRts** – In November, *KVC_aRts* shared interviews with talented people providing fun and funny performances in our local communities including David Fleming’s interview with comedian, Bobcat Goldthwait and Rick Dulock’s chat with Clinton Rothwell, Ballet Master with Inland Pacific Ballet. The Goldthwait interview previewed stand-up appearances in Temecula and Inland Pacific Ballet premiered its annual production of the Nutcracker in November.
- **CAR TALK** – The hilarious *Car Talk* duo of Tom and Ray Magliozzi, known affectionately as Click & Clack, The Tappet Brothers are more than two years into retirement. Tom passed away just over one year ago. As *Car Talk*’s popularity wanes, we have replaced the Sunday broadcast of the program with something new: *The New Yorker Radio Hour*. *TNYRH* is a smart and affordable choice as a replacement program and airs Sundays at 12:00 noon in our radio lineup.

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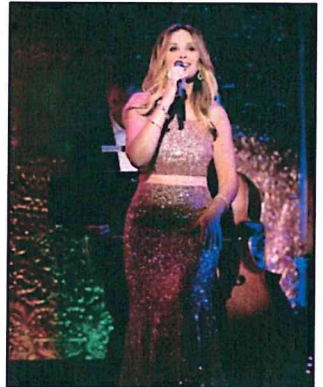

- **DECEMBER PROGRAMS** – 1. *Gaida Valenti: From Venice with Love*

Backed by a 26-piece orchestra, Giada performs in a spectacular setting that recalls her magical hometown. Sunday, December 13 at 8:30pm; 2. *Navy Seals: Their Untold Story* – Recounts the ticking-clock missions of the "Commandoes of the Deep" through firsthand accounts—including that of a D-Day demolition team member—and through never-before-see footage, home movies, and personal mementoes. Wednesday, December 16 at 9:00pm; 3. *Getting to the Nutcracker* – A behind the



scenes look at what it takes each year to produce the Nutcracker Ballet from auditions to final performance, following the Los Angeles based, Marat Daukayev Ballet Theatre, led by the former Kirov star. Boys and girls, ages 3-18 are profiled; passionate people who, with their families, make incredible sacrifices of time and money, just so that they may dance. Friday, December 18 at 9:00pm; 4. *Chaplains* – This

program takes the viewer into the dynamic world of chaplains—men and women who represent their own particular faith tradition, but are trained to be of comfort and support to everyone—religious nor not. Through personal profiles, the documentary explores the daily life of chaplains throughout society. Saturday, December 19 at 6:00pm; 5. *American Experience – The Pilgrims* – Discover the harrowing and brutal truths behind the Pilgrims' arrival in the New World and the myths of Thanksgiving. Director Ric Burns explores the history of our nation's beginnings in this epic tale of converging forces. Wednesday, December 23 at 8:00pm



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PRODUCTION:

1. Completed the first draft of our documentary, ***Autism: Behind the Camera***. The program focuses on young adults with autism and resources needed when students with autism “age out” of high school. This program explores vocational alternatives. ***Autism: Behind the Camera*** has been submitted to APT (American Public Television) for approval for national distribution. We should know in early January if approved. If accepted the program will air in April for Autism Awareness month.
2. We produced a night of programming for Veterans. We aired, ***In Her Boots*** our local program that focused on female veterans and the challenges they face as women and veterans. It was followed by our LIVE show, ***For Our Veterans***, which highlighted three non-profits in our region dedicated to serve our veterans.
3. The production team recorded and edited TV pledge breaks that will air during our upcoming television pledge drive. Including an Il Volo concert and Downton Abbey, watch for the new shows coming in December.
4. The production team shot and edited a speech presentation for SBVC President Gloria Fisher. It was provided to San Bernardino City Schools for a conference.
5. Staff also edited new TV underwriter spots for our media sponsorship for Cinema Culturas and the San Bernardino County Museum.

DEVELOPMENT

- **GRANTS** – KVCR continues to actively pursue foundation and grant funding for November, 2015. In November, a grant proposal was submitted to Aerojet/Rocketdyne Foundation. This proposal is for the benefit of the FNX channel. This proposal endeavors to highlight the stories and achievements of eight Native American scholars in Post-Secondary education STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) studies at local post-secondary institutions in the Inland Southern California region. The students will be interviewed for short segments to be aired as ***FNX Now*** segments. The segment may be woven into a final thirty minute documentary at the conclusion of the grant period. The value is to enhance awareness of STEM studies and occupational advantages of such for Native American students. The value of the request is \$75,000. Notification is expected in mid-spring of 2016. Additionally, six letters of inquiry were prepared for well-established family foundations, to solicit funding requests. Research was completed to identify grant proposal opportunities for December, 2015, including the Clif Bar Family Foundation (\$10,000 potential face value) and grants are being calendared for quarter 1, 2016 (January - March). These include two or three National Endowment for the Arts proposals.
- **UNDERWRITING**
 1. La Sierra University has contracted KVCR FM for its annual archeology discovery weekend. KVCR was part of the seventh annual Archaeology Discovery Weekend which featured the Syria and its many treasures, in discovering the wonders Syria has to offer. It was a look into Syria's human history and culture as well as the illicit use of artifacts to fund Syria's civil war. La Sierra has been a sponsor and supporter of KVCR's programming and outreach to our community.
 2. San Bernardino Medical Group - This group of medical practitioners have been serving the residents of San Bernardino for the past 35 years. The company is interested in teaming up with KVCR in their new marketing campaign to gain local health awareness and public support.

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- **MEMBERSHIP DRIVES** – KVCR TV’s membership pledge drive begins on Friday, November 27 through Sunday, December 13. Giada Valenti, an Italian soprano, will be a guest in the TV studio on Sunday, December 13, for a LIVE pledge night to promote her show and concert tour *Giada Valenti: From Venice with Love*. Giada will be performing at The Fox Performing Arts Center and KVCR has tickets to the event.

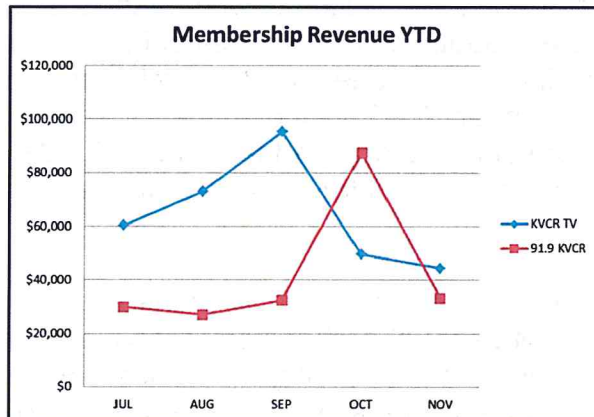
The fundraising goal for the 17-day drive is \$140,000. We anticipate programs with a concert ticket offer to be high performers like ***Trans-Siberian Orchestra: The Birth of Rock Theatre***, ***Ethan Bortnick Live in Concert: The Power of Music and Il Volo: Live from Pompeii***. New pledge shows include How-To’s, drama and performances like ***Josh Groban: Stages, Classical Rewind 2, A Salute to Downtown Abbey*** (previewing the final season of Downton Abbey), ***Eric Clapton: Slowhand at 70 – Live at the Royal Albert Hall***, ***Jacques Pepin’s 80th Birthday Celebration*** and ***Celtic Woman: Destiny*** to be crowd pleasers.

KVCR FM membership drive is scheduled for Tuesday, December 8 through Thursday, December 11. As part of the 4-day drive we’ll have a Feed Your Radio, Feed A Family one day campaign. Based on previous years we are expecting to raise \$16,000 during this one day and \$35,000 total for the 4-day campaign.



Also, as part of the End-of-Year campaign, we’ll be sending End-of-Year gift appeals to our KVCR donors. It is projected to receive \$60,000 in pledges from these campaigns. Planned gifts and sustainer upgrades appeals are also scheduled by the end of the year.

- **REVENUE UPDATE** – We have currently raised \$553,530 from all membership revenue sources. Total revenue including membership and other initiatives \$587,995.

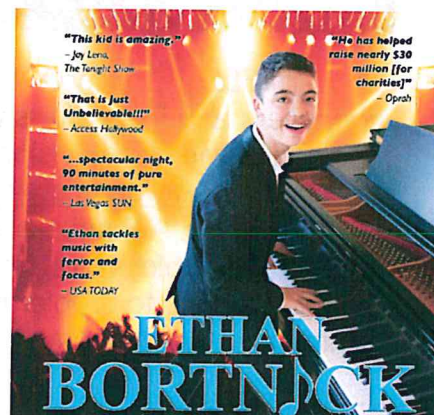

JUNE 12, 2016 – Giada Valenti: From Venice with Love:

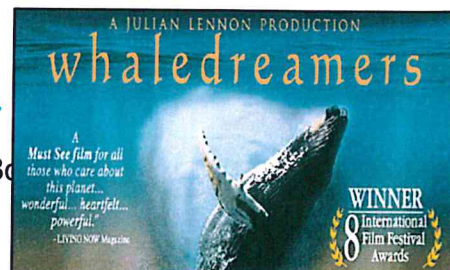

Thursdays at 8:00pm.
- **KAGAGI** – This FNX cartoon series features Matthew Carver, an Algonquin boy who is destined to become Kagagi, a Native - Canadian super hero. At first, Matthew refuses the call, not wanting to be burdened with responsibility, but as those around him suffer at the hands of the Windigo, he has no choice but to fight as Kagagi, finally accepting his destiny. Weekdays at 9:00am.
- **WHALE DREAMERS** – Joe Morris Sr. shares his experience working as a Navajo Code Talker during World War II. Lying

about his age to obtain a draft registration card, he was inducted into the Marine Corps in 1944. He was assigned to Navajo Communication School that was created to devise an unbreakable code based on the Navajo language for the military to use during combat. This documentary was created in an effort to preserve and share the story of the Navajo Code Talkers. Sunday, December 13 at 3:00pm.

- **OSIYO: VOICES OF THE CHEROKEE PEOPLE** – Osiyo, Voices of the Cherokee People is a monthly news magazine-style program featuring the people, places, history and culture of the Cherokee Nation. Show host Jennifer Loren has been connecting with Cherokees in all parts of Oklahoma and elsewhere, seeking out unique stories that will give people a better understanding of the authentic Cherokee experience. Wednesdays at 4:30pm.



- **STORYTELLERS IN MOTION** – The show turns the spotlight on the next wave of Aboriginal storytellers and filmmakers who are harnessing the power of mass media, film, video, television and the digital world, to reach their audiences. Saturdays at 4:30pm.
- **VOICES OF....** – Features important topics such as education, leadership, employment, and opportunities in Indian Country, and finding solutions to problems and answers involved in the community. Wednesdays at 4:30pm.



PRODUCTION

- **WAA'T CELEBRATION** – The FNX production team began principle photography on a project for the San Manuel Band of Mission Indians on November 16th. FNX was hired by the tribe to document their Waa't Celebration. The annual event is held at Crafton Hills College and features a learning experience for Redlands and Yucaipa elementary school students. Students take part in hands-on lessons covering aspects of California Indian culture including basketry, pottery, music and lessons in the Serrano Indian language. In the Serrano Indian language "Waa't" (Juniper) is associated with the Crafton Hills area of Yucaipa.
- **FNX NOW** – An *FNX NOW* segment shot with Carly Sage Curly in Indian Alley, Downtown Los Angeles will premiere on November 26th. The interviews and footage was captured as Carly, the first female muralist to adorn the alley walls erected a mural on the 2nd and 3rd stories of the former United American Indian Involvement building. "UAI" was an outreach center for American Indians that became an important locus for social, spiritual, political and rehabilitative activities for the community by providing health and support services to Los Angeles' Native American population.
- **ON THE SCENE** – FNX welcomed the Pawnee and Seminole Hiphop Artist Quece IMC into the studio on November 12th. The interview will air on FNX as part of the *On The Scene* series and will launch in conjunction with the artist's Aboriginal Unity Experience (AUX) music video series premiere.

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Resolution FA15.06 SBCCD District Reserve Funds

SBVC Academic Senate Executive Committee

Whereas, the San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) budget includes a 15% reserve fund balance and in recent years reserve funds have been over 20% and 30%, and subsequently in some years this has resulted in the freezing of San Bernardino Valley College (SBVC) funds by the district;

Whereas, the state economic conditions have improved significantly and the state of California now has a “rainy day fund” through the passage of Proposition 2 and AB 1463 allows for the activation of maximum caps on school districts, which will result in most school districts having a 6% maximum cap on their reserves;

Whereas, SBVC serves a significant population of students who need remedial education, and reports below average success and transfer rates;

Whereas, SBVC lacks adequate resources to serve the unique needs of its student population, including but not limited to full-time faculty, instructional, laboratory, career and technical classrooms, institutionalized funding for college-wide tutoring, instructional technology, replacement of outdated and nonoperational instructional equipment, and program budgets; and

Whereas, Title 5 Section 53200 defines budget development as an academic and professional matter;

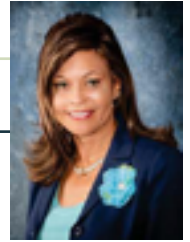
Resolved, the SBVC Academic Senate recommends to the Chancellor and District Board of Trustees a reduction of the reserve fund balance to 10%; and

Resolved, the Chancellor and District Board of Trustees incorporate into their budget development a financial plan that includes the restoration of SBVC full-time faculty positions which were not replaced due to budgetary restraints imposed on the college by the district within recent years in addition to the full-time faculty positions yet to be hired for which the district has received additional state funding.

MCHS Students Perform 20% Better in College Courses



A recent study by the SBVC Office of Research, Planning and Institutional Effectiveness found that students from the Middle College High School (MCHS) performed nearly 20% better on college-level coursework at SBVC compared to all other students enrolled between Fall 2013 and Summer 2015. For math courses, MCHS students' success rates were even greater, between 20 and 30 percentage points higher than SBVC campus-wide's data. English courses were between 10 and 20 percentage points greater for MCHS students. Way to seize the day, MCHS!

"Ask a Counselor" Intercepts and Helps Students

In the recently-concluded Ask a Counselor event, 13 sessions were held across different parts of the campus in high-traffic areas during designated times of the day for morning, afternoon, and evening. During these sessions, counselors reconnected with students as part of their counseling follow-up services. Students were engaged by way of question and answer discourse on SB 1456 and how the law positively impacts students' college experience. Additionally, workshops have occurred in linked as well as in non-STEM classes with supplemental instruction tutors. Highlighted during the Ask a Counselor and workshop activities were the following - importance of defining, in a timely manner, an academic goal and a program of study, having a comprehensive education plan on Web Advisor, and more importantly, maintaining satisfactory academic performance, and observing realistic timelines required to meet the mandates. These workshops are designed to develop in students skills and resourcefulness associated with student success. Topics covered this semester were time management, general education literacy, and study skills. As always, developmental and comprehensive counseling services were afforded to the general population.

Foster & Kinship Care Update

The Foster & Kinship Care Education Program participated in several community collaborative meetings to promote the FKCE classes and to share successful strategies and challenges inherent in serving children and youth living in out of home care. The classes have been well attended as the foster and kinship caregivers are being required to take more classes to meet the needs of the children in their care. More emphasis is being placed on educating resource parents about the impact of trauma on the development and behavior of children in foster care and how to respond appropriately to the behavioral and emotional challenges of traumatized children. They also develop skills on how to take care of themselves and seek support from others when needed.

Outreach Update

During the month of October, the Outreach & Recruitment Department coordinated with several departments to provide campus tours for prospective students, including 120 Promise Scholars from Sultana Elementary. The Outreach & Recruitment Program Assistant provided informative classroom presentations at Summit High School, Thompson Elementary, Frisbee Middle School and New Vision Academy. Outreach & Recruitment Student Ambassadors attended community events to provide college enrollment information at table settings and presentations. The Outreach & Recruitment Program Assistant and Student Ambassadors attended College and Career Fairs at Colton High School, San Bernardino High School, Redlands High School, Hope Academy and CSUSB for Feria Educativa.
