The programs and curricula of the District shall be of high quality, relevant to community and student needs, and evaluated regularly to ensure quality and currency. To that end, the Chancellor shall establish procedures for the development and review of all curricular offerings, including their establishment, modification, or discontinuance.

The curriculum process is supported by Administrators and classified professionals throughout the District who will collaborate to work with faculty to implement equity-minded practices.

All new programs and program discontinuances shall be approved by the Board of Trustees.

All new programs shall be submitted to the California Community College Chancellor's Office for approval as required.

Individual degree-applicable credit courses offered as part of a permitted educational program shall be approved by the Board. Non-degree-applicable credit and degree-applicable courses that are not part of an existing approved program must satisfy the conditions authorized by Title 5 regulations and shall be approved by the Board.

Credit Hour

Consistent with federal regulations applicable to federal financial aid eligibility, the District shall assess and designate each of its programs as either a "credit hour" program or a "clock hour" program.

The Chancellor shall establish procedures:

• which prescribe the definition of "credit hour" consistent with applicable federal regulations, as they apply to community college districts.

DEGREE MODIFICATION

Psychology Associate in Arts - Transfer Degree, AA-T

Psychology is both a natural and a social science concerned with the study of human behavior, thoughts, and emotions. As such, it is a broad discipline which involves both pure science and practical application of science to matters of daily living. The Psychology Associate in Arts Degree for Transfer (Psychology AA-T degree) provides students with an education in the core aspects of Psychology which include research methods, statistics, biological influences on behavior and mental processes, and major theoretical perspectives in the discipline. The Psychology AA-T degree prepares students for transfer to CSU campuses that offer bachelor's degrees in psychology.

The Associate in Arts for Transfer (AA-T) or the Associate in Science for Transfer (AS-T) is intended for students who plan to complete a bachelor's degree in a similar major at a CSU campus. Students completing these degrees (AA-T or AS-T) are guaranteed admission to the CSU system, but not to a particular campus or major.

To earn a Psychology AA-T degree, students must meet the following requirements:

- completion of the following major requirements with a minimum grade of "C" (or "P").
- completion of a minimum of 60 CSU transferable semester units with a grade point average of at least 2.0; and
- certified completion of the CSU General Education-Breadth (CSUGE) or Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), which requires a minimum of 37-39 units.

It is highly recommended that students complete courses that satisfy the U.S. History, Constitution, and American Ideals requirement as part of CSUGE or IGETC before transferring to a CSU.

It is also highly recommended that students complete ENGL 101/101H or the equivalent before taking any Psychology courses beyond Psychology 100/100H.

DEGREE CORRECTION

Architecture and Environmental Design - A.S. Degree

To graduate with a specialization in Architecture and Environmental Design, a student must complete the following courses in addition to the general breadth requirements for an Associate's Degree. For transfer students, these courses will provide students with the tools needed to construct a portfolio that will be required to transfer into Architecture Programs at 4-year institutions. Along with a successful portfolio, these courses should also constitute the first two years of an Architecture Program. In addition, these courses should help students interested in transferring to 4-year institutions in Environmental Design fields, and as Landscape Architecture, Interior Design, and Urban Planning majors. Historically, the built environment has not always incorporated marginalized voices, sustainability, and environmental justice. In the US and globally, there is a long history of the built environment erasing and subjugating disenfranchised populations. This is one of many forms of structural racism. Within this degree, students will be exposed to contributions from underrepresented architects, planners, designers, and engineers that prioritize environmental sustainability, justice, equity, and accessibility. Students will also consider the impact of design on underrepresented populations and will develop tools and strategies for mitigating those impacts.

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CHC CELEBRATES GROUNDBREAKING

Your Measure CC Tax Dollars at Work. Celebrate CHC's groundbreaking ceremony on May 31, 2023 at 2:00 p.m.

The new Finkelstein Performing Arts Center will provide instructional spaces for music, theater, and dance programs at Crafton Hills College. The projected \$41 million cost of the building will be funded through a voterapproved bond measure and state- matching funds.

The modern, multifunctional, 24,000 square foot performing arts venue will be located where the old gym was demolished and will replace the existing Finkelstein Performing Arts Center. The new building will include a 270- seat main theater, a smaller blackbox theater, dressing rooms, a green room, offices, a scene shop, a costume shop, as well as music recital rooms and a recording studio.

With a design that uses indoor and outdoor teaching and learning spaces, the project is already being recognized for its green building efficiencies and sustainable building operations. Shaded patios, specially designed and placed windows, and solar panels will increase energy efficiency while the drought-tolerant landscaping and electric car charging stations will help reach carbon neutrality.

This addition to the campus will significantly enhance the creative arts of the College and strengthen its performing arts programs.

SBVC PARTNERSHIP LEADS TO NEW OPPORTUNITIES

The San Bernardino community gathered in front of the new Transportation & Advanced Technology Center at Pacific High School for its ribbon-cutting ceremony on February 9, 2023. The 20,060 square foot building is the first of its kind in California.

Since 2016, the SBVC Applied Technology, Transportation, and Culinary Arts Department has partnered with Pacific High School I to create guided pathways for high school students. SBVC Professor Berchman 'Kenny' Melancon and social studies teacher CJ Eastwood spearheaded the project.

SBVC offers dual enrollment and has articulation agreements that allow high school students to take courses during the day and receive college credit. With the new state-of-the-art facility, SBVC will bring some of its courses and instructors directly to the students. Students can receive certification as early as their high school graduation and enter high wage and high demand careers in the transportation industry.

"It gives them a fast-track to a career in the industry," said Dr. Vanessa Thomas, Dean of Applied Technology, Transportation, and Culinary Arts at SBVC. "These students can start earning a living wage, they can support their families financially and contribute to the local economy."

of cooperation on getting better access to food for hungry students.

Chancellor Diana Z. Rodriguez of the San Bernardino Community College District spoke passionately about the issue, saying, "I never thought that student hunger would rank so high on my list of educational priorities. But it does. Students don't learn when they are hungry."

Those around the table included:

Senator Rosilicie Ochoa Bogh Assembly Majority Leader Eloise Gomez Reyes San Bernardino County Supervisor Joe Baca, Jr. Gov. Gavin Newsom's office Assemblymember Corey Jackson's office San Bernardino County Supervisor Jesse Armendarez's office Riverside County Supervisor Karen Spiegel's office Roundtable co-hosts included: Cal State University San Bernardino Community Action Partnership of Riverside County Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino County Riverside Community College District University of California, Riverside

U.S. Senator Alex Padilla sent a <u>video message</u> to the group, in which he stated, "We can't let students sacrifice their health to afford a higher education."

In his opening remarks, RCCD Chancellor Wolde-Ab Isaac noted, "The U.S. is the wealthiest nation in the world. California has the fourth largest economy. But, a disproportionate number of college students in the Inland Empire lack the basic necessities." He observed, "We need to expand access to CalFresh and eliminate hunger as a barrier to higher education. Over the long term, we must wage war against poverty and inequity."

They all agreed that mapped boundaries and privacy laws become hurdles for hungry students, as each program requires a new application. Even when students successfully jump the bureaucratic hurdles, the benefits come on EBT cards, and only 10 percent of college cafeterias accept them.

"We need to increase student access to CalFresh on and off campus," said SBCCD Chancellor Rodriguez, referring to a program that helps low-income people in California buy healthy food. It is also known as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) at the federal level.

Marlene Garcia, executive director of the California Student Aid Commission, called it a historic meeting. She said it is rare to have so many public agencies making time to be in the same room to talk about finding solutions to student hunger. It is a big problem in the Inland region, where over 181,000 college students may be going hungry without CalFresh assistance. Statewide, nearly 750,000 are eligible for CalFresh, but only 1 in 6 receive help.

"College students have historically been left out of food support because people assume that they are only temporarily poor," Garcia said. But students fill out the federal financial aid paperwork and it contains so much information.

"College students have historically been left out of food support because people assume that they are only temporarily poor," Garcia said. But students fill out the federal financial aid paperwork and it contains so much information.

One policy change that might help is to make that one application apply to more programs. "Let the FAFSA prepopulate applications for other public assistance programs," said Catalina Cifuentes, an executive director at the Riverside County Office of Education who also serves as California Student Aid Commission chair and commissioner.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the federal government made applications for food aid easier. As the pandemic emergency orders expire next month, those benefits will become more limited.

There is a June 9 deadline for students to reapply for food aid, and they could get up to one more year of benefits, according to Allison Gonzales, an assistant director at the Riverside County Department of Public Social Services.

San Bernardino Supervisor Joe Baca, Jr. said his office could help make more information available to colleges about who has applied to county programs, to try to streamline other applications.

According to Angel Rodriguez, an associate vice chancellor at San Bernardino Community College District and California Student Aid commissioner, Baca Jr.'s pledge to share county data may catalyze a chain of collaboration within the group.

"It is mind-boggling that we have not been able to put this together," said Assembly Majority Leader Eloise Gomez Reyes. "We are leaving half a billion federal dollars on the table. We are going to team up to bring that money back to our students." Reyes is proposing two bills this year, <u>AB</u> <u>1514</u> and <u>AB 928</u>, which the California Student Aid Commission considers vital in improving access to food aid for students.

Ideas started popping up around the room. What about a YouTube channel to help struggling students with cooking skills, and financial management? What about an algorithm that knows if a student has applied to CalFresh, they would also qualify for CalWorks or for financial aid?

What if we don't pay so much attention to which county they live in, we just get them the food resources? Could there be a check box where they opt-in to several programs at one time? Could a college mental health collaboration serve as a model for the collaboration around hunger?

Chancellor Rodriguez said this is the first of what should be a valuable collaboration across boundaries to keep the needs of students as a first priority. She asked, "What can we do right now? Or as we say at my house, right now, right now."

The trustees set the direction for financial aid, new buildings, and campus safety for a system that serves 20,000 students through two campuses, a workforce training facility, and KVCR TV/FM.

He has taken classes off and on over the years at both Valley College and Crafton Hills, but recently about 90 percent of his classes are online. He is the single father of two sons, ages 20 and 18. They live in Moreno Valley.

"I like public service and helping people," said Alexander. "When my kids went through school, I was helping in the schools. I've been involved with the state PTA. I've done a lot of advocacy. I've served at the local and state levels of student government. I'd like to get into politics someday and make a difference."

Del Rosario is a Film/TV/Media and Theater Arts major at San Bernardino Valley College. One day, he hopes to be a film director. He lives in San Bernardino and has served as the Associated Student Government president.

He has been active on campus, performing in plays, making films, and participating in student leadership activities. From March to June this year, he worked as an intern at KVCR, the public TV and radio station on campus. He worked as a camera operator to capture two concerts at the Redlands Bowl. He said the experience is helping to prepare him for a career.

"At KVCR, everything is state of the art and up to professional industry standards," Del Rosario said. "You learn how to shoot professional broadcast quality."

OVERVIEW

SBCCD has entered the second year of its 2022-27 Strategic Plan. The current document provides a midterm review of important actions and highlights related to Goal-4 (Ensure Fiscal Accountability/Sustainability).

ANALYSIS

In continued efforts to ensure fiscal accountability/sustainability, SBCCD initiated targeted efforts to expand its grant opportunities resulting in \$8M in new awards. These awards have funded free textbooks and course materials to more than 13,000 of its students. Collaborative efforts and participation in events with local and state government officials have allowed SBCCD to highlight its impact on students and the community. Approved scheduled maintenance projects are in the pipeline as well as the creation of new scholarship opportunities to lower the cost of receiving an education.

UPDATES: SPRING 2023

- SBCCD hosted The U.S. Government Accountability Office as they conducted a facility-needs assessment to identify areas for improvement and increase federal funding for infrastructure upgrades.
- SBCCD has reaffirmed its commitment to improving student access and success and reducing the cost of education by continuing the Books+ program through spring 2024.

BP 3300 PUBLIC RECORDS Changes Redlined

From current SBCCD BP 3300 titled Public Records

The Chancellor shall establish procedures for records management, including access by the public, that comply with the requirements of the California Public Records Act.

References: Government Code Sections 6250, et seq.

AP 3300 PUBLIC RECORDS With Changes Redlined

(Replaces current SBCCD AP 3300)

Members of the public may request to inspect or copy public records. A request by a member of the public may be delivered by mail or in person to the Chancellor's Office.

Any request shall identify with reasonable specificity the records that are sought. If additional information is needed, the Chancellor or designee may request it be provided in writing.

Any request to inspect records shall be made sufficiently in advance of the date of inspection to allow staff members time to assemble the records and identify any records that may be exempt from disclosure.

Records that are exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act or any other provision of law may not be inspected or copied by members of the public. Social security numbers must be redacted from records before they are disclosed to the public. [Moved from here to improve readability.]

Members of the public shall be assisted in identifying records or information that may respond to their request. Assistance that will be provided includes: the information technology and physical location in which the records exist; practical suggestions for overcoming denial of access to the records or information; and the estimated date and time when the records will be made available.

Within ten days, the Business ManagerChancellor or designee will determine whether or not the records can be produced and will communicate the determination to the member of the public requesting the record(s).

CHAPTER LEAD RECOMMENDATION P&P 3300 PUBLIC RECORDS

AP 3300 PUBLIC RECORDS With Changes Redlined

[Moved to here to improve readability.] Records that are exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act or any other provision of law may not be inspected or copied by members of the public. Social security numbers must be redacted from records before they are disclosed to the public.

The most common exemptions for community colleges include:

- Student records (Education Code Section 76243)
- Preliminary drafts, notes, or interagency or intra-agency memoranda that are not retained by the public agency in the
 ordinary course of business, provided that the public interest in withholding the records clearly outweighs the public
 interest in disclosure. (Government Code Section 6254(a))
- Records pertaining to pending litigation ...or to claims...until the pending litigation or claim has been finally adjudicated or otherwise settled. (Government Code Section 6254(b))
- Personnel, medical or similar files, the disclosure of which would constitute an unwarranted invasion of personal privacy (Government Code Section 6254(c))
- Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used to administer a licensing examination, examination for employment, or academic examination [except for standardized tests provided for by Education Code Sections 99150 et seq.]. (Government Code Section 6254(g).)
- The contents of real estate appraisals or engineering or feasibility estimates and evaluations...relative to the acquisition of property, or to prospective public supply and construction contracts, until all of the property has been acquired or all of the contract agreement obtained. (Government Code Section 6254(h)).
- Internet posting of home address or telephone numbers of local elected officials (Government Code Section 6254.21)
- Home address, home telephone number, cellular phone number, and date of birth of employees of a school district or county office of education (other than to an agent or family member of the employee, to an officer of another school district when necessary, to an employee organization, or to an agency or employee of a health benefit plan.) (Government Code Section 6254.3)
- Personal email addresses (other than to an agent or family member of the employee, to an officer of another school district when necessary, to an employee organization, or to an agency or employee of a health benefit plan) unless the email address is used by the employee to conduct public business, or necessary to identify a person in an otherwise disclosable communication. (Government Code Section 6254.3(b)).
- Records regarding alternative investments (i.e. an investment in a private equity fund, venture fund, hedge fund, or absolute return fund; limited partnership, limited liability company or similar legal structure) involving public investment funds, unless already publicly released by the keeper of the information.
- Information security records, if disclosure of that record would reveal vulnerabilities to, or otherwise increase the potential for an attack on, the District's information technology system.

BP 6535 USE OF DISTRICT EQUIPMENT Changes Redlined

The Board of Trustees authorizes the Chancellor to develop administrative regulations allowing for limited off-campus use of District equipment. District equipment shall not be loaned to private groups organized for profit or to any individual, except that equipment may be loaned to employees for District-related duties off-campus subject to the provisions outlined in the administrative procedures.

AP 6535 USE OF DISTRICT EQUIPMENT With Changes Redlined

(Replaces current SBCCD AP 3760)

Each member of the District staff shall be responsible for equipment under his/her/their control. Loss of equipment and unauthorized removal of equipment should be reported immediately to the appropriate administrator.

Equipment that is lost or stolen may be replaced upon submission of a request through the appropriate administrative office. The request must include an explanation about the loss or theft of the equipment and a justification that replacement is essential to the activity served.

District equipment shall not be loaned to persons not employed by or enrolled in the District.

Equipment shall only be removed from campus with proper authorization(s).

A. Authorization

District-owned equipment shall not be removed from any District facility except with written permission of the college president, Chancellor, or designee. Authorization may be granted for the uses listed below through the "College Equipment Loan Agreement." No item of equipment shall be removed under any circumstance until the warehouse supervisor has inventoried it and assigned a property control number. <u>Upon request or separation from the District, the person(s) must return all District issued property</u>. If the property cannot be returned, the person(s) shall be responsible for the cost of replacement.

AP 6535 USE OF DISTRICT EQUIPMENT With Changes Redlined

B. Permitted Uses

District-owned equipment may be removed from campus, with proper authorization, for the following uses.

1. Professional/Business Use

Staff members may borrow District-owned equipment for professional use directly related to District business. In the case of computer or other electronic equipment no installation support will be provided unless the District requires such use. Upon request or separation from the District, the employee must return all District issued property. If the property cannot be returned, the employee shall be responsible for the cost of replacement.

2. Student Instructional Use

District-owned equipment such as musical instruments or photography equipment may be loaned to students as they are required as part of the instructional program. Such loan shall be limited to the term in which the student is enrolled. Upon request from the District, the student must return all District issued property. If the property cannot be returned, the student shall be responsible for the cost of replacement.

3. Community Support Use

Under special circumstances District-owned equipment may be loaned on a short-term basis in support of a special community project. Under such use the equipment shall be loaned to a specific community agency that shall supply a certificate of insurance for the equipment while under its control. <u>Upon request from the District, the agency must return all</u> <u>District issued property</u>. If the property cannot be returned, the agency shall be responsible for the cost of replacement.

C. Responsibility

Any individual who removes District-owned property assumes personal liability for repair or replacement of such equipment in the event of damage or theft.

D. Recall

Any loaned equipment is subject to recall by a college or District official at any time.

BP 6540 INSURANCE Changes Redlined

(Replaces current SBCCD BP 6540)

The Chancellor<u>or designee</u> shall be responsible to secure insurance for the District as required by law, which shall include but is not limited to the liabilities described in Education Code Section 72506 as follows:

- Liability for damages for death, injury to persons, or damage or loss of property;.
- Personal liability of the members of the Board of Trustees and the officers and employees of the District for damages for death, injury to a person, or damage or loss of property caused by the negligent act or omission of the member, officer, or employee when acting within the scope of his/ or her office or employment. The Chancellor may authorize coverage for persons who perform volunteer services for the District.
- Worker's compensation insurance.

Insurance also shall include fire insurance and insurance against other perils.

The District may join in a joint powers agreement pursuant to Education Code Section 81603 for the purposes described in this policy.

AP 6540 INSURANCE With Changes Redlined

Pursuant to Education Code Section 81603, the District shall be a member of one or more Joint Partnership Agreements (JPA) for the purpose of providing the following coverage:

- Liability insurance protecting the District, its employees. Board of Trustee members, Foundation Board directors, and Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee members, against liability for negligence while acting within the scope of their duties.
- Property insurance protecting the District's Real Property, and Personal Property except automobiles, against loss suffered from fire, power failure, vandalism, and other sources, excepting damage caused by "acts of God" such as earthquake, flood, wear and tear, and similar causes as defined by the JPA.
- District vehicle insurance shall be provided under a General Comprehensive Liability Policy, with additional coverage as available through the JPA.
- Workers' Compensation Insurance meeting all requirements of the State of California, for all district employees.

Student health insurance shall be available to cover student injuries incurred in the course of participation in district-sponsored activities including athletics.

Independent contractors must obtain their own insurance coverage; no insurance of any kind will be provided to independent contractors by the District.

NOTE: If a District establishes a fund for losses and payments for health and welfare benefits for its employees for the purpose of covering the deductible amount under deductible types of insurance policies, losses or payments arising from self-insurance programs, or losses or payments due to noninsured perils, the District must secure the services of an actuarial to provide an actuarial evaluation of the future annual costs of such benefits.

NOTE: Education Code Section 81602 specifically authorizes the District to contract for investigative, administrative and claims adjustment services. The contract may provide that the contracting firm may reject, settle, compromise and approve claims within limits and for amounts specified by the Board, including execution and issuing of checks in payment of such claims. The contract may also provide that the contracting firm may employ counsel.



RECOMMENDATION

This item is for information only and no action is required.

OVERVIEW

The District's budget is a financial plan based on estimated revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year, which runs from July 1 through June 30. Cash refers to what is actually in the District's treasury on a day-to-day and month-to-month basis. District cash balances are reviewed regularly and monitoring the amount of cash available to meet financial obligations is a core responsibility of the Fiscal Services Department. Fiscal year forecasts are updated monthly using the most current actual revenue and expense data and any new guidance from the State. Attached is the restricted and unrestricted General Fund monthly cash flow analysis.

ANALYSIS

As noted in the forecast, cash balances fluctuate throughout the year based on the amount and timing of actual and estimated revenues and expenses. The current cash estimate as of June 30, 2023, decreased \$6,634,307 to \$56,882,432 from the previous estimate of \$63,516,739. The cash balance decrease is primarily due to budgeted revenues originally expected to be received in the current year that are now expected in Fiscal 2024.

OVERVIEW

Per SBCCD Administrative Procedure 7110, in the case of short-term hourly/substitute and student employees, the Board has delegated the Chancellor or his/her designee as the authorizing agent for hire.

California Education Code section 88003 outlines the criterion for hiring an employee on a temporary basis. The length of temporary employment is less than \$75.00% of the college year, which amounts to 195 working days. Types of temporary employment include:

- <u>Professional Expert</u>: Districts can go outside the classified service when the scope of work is discrete, temporary, and requires expertise not available within the classified service. Requesting departments certify these by defining the project and identifying an end date for the project. Continued employment is contingent on continued demand and/or funding.
- <u>Short-Term</u>: Districts can use short-term employees on a temporary basis to perform a service upon completion of which, the service, or similar services, will not be extended or needed on a continuous basis.
- <u>Substitute:</u> Districts can employ substitute employees to fill in for a classified employee that is temporarily absent from duty, or if the district is recruiting to hire a vacant position.

ANALYSIS

The attached list of Professional Expert, Short-Term, and Substitute Employees is certified to be in accordance with California Education Code section 88003.



A 'Night Out' at Crafton Hills College Raises More Than \$186,000 for Students

A Night Out Fundraiser, hosted by Crafton Hills College's Foundation, raised more than \$186,000 for students

Supporters gathered under a tent set up in the College's quad on April 6 to raise funds for the CHC Foundation, a nonprofit dedicated to bettering the lives of Roadrunners.

The annual event and Foundation's largest fundraiser brought in thousands through student sponsorships and silent and live auctions. Items included behind-theplate seating at an Angels baseball game and a seven-night stay at any Wyndham Timeshare Resort. Since its founding, the CHC Foundation has helped students reach their dreams of higher education. The Foundation does this by raising funds year-round to support student scholarships, financial hardship grants and educational programs.

Students Dakota Erwin, a member of the current graduating class, and Anthony Estrada, a recent Crafton grad, explained to the Night Out audience how without the nonprofit's support, they might not have achieved their educational goals.

"I didn't think I could come back to college and work full-time until I realized I'm never going to make enough money to go back to school so I might as well do both," she continued. "I worked full-time. I came back for that one class and the opportunities that Crafton gave me made me realize I could do both."

"Dakota hit the nail on the head," Estrada added minutes later. "Truly, thank you. I'm not sure a lot of you understand when I say, "Thank you," how much it means to me because I'm not one of those guys that usually asks for help. But when I reached out to [Paramedic Director] Amanda [Ward] and the Foundation, they helped me with open arms and continue to help me to this day."

Guests also enjoyed comments from Crafton leaders and a brief musical performance from Foundation President Dr. Phong Nguyen.

This year's Outstanding Alumnus honor went to Dr. Stephanie Houston, a rockstar in the world of education who currently chairs the San Bernardino Community College District Board and serves as assistant superintendent of innovation and engagement for the San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools.



This year's program runs for five days in mid-July and will address topics such as Contemporary Leadership Challenges; Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging; and Leading Transformational Changes.

Lopez has some advice for those looking

to get into the field: talk to her: "I would be happy to tell [anyone] how rewarding this career path is and how it is connected to so many disciplines," she continued.

Application Fees Waived for Transfer Students

The Crafton Hills College Foundation provides student fee waivers to cover the application fees for Roadrunners transferring to four-year schools, providing financial relief for low-income students and enabling them to apply to more universities.

Applicants with a 2.5 GPA or higher and attendance at an application workshop can apply for fee waivers through the CHC Transfer Center. The Foundation has supported over 250 students since 2015 and aims to extend educational opportunities to all CHC students through scholarships, grants, and other funding

sources.

The fee to apply to one UC or CSU campus is \$70. Through this program at Crafton, students are able to receive reimbursement of application fees for applications at two institutions.

The Inland Empire Urban Forestry Collaboration (IEUFC) Conservation and Building a Stronger Workforce

In January of 2023, SBCCD/EDCT was invited by Sandy Bonilla of the Southern California Mountains Foundation to a brainstorming meeting regarding opportunities to offer training and education through the Department of Forestry (CAL FIRE) Grants Program. Because there is a need for fire mitigation in California and vocational education training that leads to sustainable wages, the (CALFIRE) grant offers a creative way to make this happen.

At the table for the session were: SBCCD/EDCT, The City of San Bernardino Parks and Recreation, Southern California Mountains Foundation, Urban Conservation Corp, The City of Rancho Cucamonga Parks and Recreation, and Cal State San Bernardino. Through many conversations and unanimous agreement, it was determined that there should be an entity that championed the effort to put this plan into action and so the Inland Empire Urban Forestry Collaboration was created.

In March of 2023, through the (CAL FIRE Grants Program) the IEUFC proposed and submitted a plan to the state to create specific training and activities that would educate the community in ways to mitigate fire damage. Such training and activities include Utility Line Clearance Arborist Training, increasing the regional tree canopy by planting trees that would thrive in this region, and providing certificated training to home and business owners regarding adding defensible spaces to their properties. The proposal also includes creating jobs with sustainable wages and recruiting a workforce to do innovative and essential work.

The IEUFC's submitted proposal would allow the resources offered through the CAL FIRE grant and collaborative efforts with IEUFC partners to recruit local youth in the region to venture into an immerging field that would lead to careers that directly affect the economy and climate in this region. Training for the Inland Empire/ Desert Region Consortium by Key Talent

John D. Baker is the founder of Core Factors, a Certified Technology of Participation (ToP)® Facilitator, facilitated training for the Inland Empire/ Desert Region's Key Talent members on March 29, 2023. John has provided organizational consulting for over 35 years primarily with government and the nonprofit sectors. His work has entailed a large spectrum of workforce and economic development agencies, community colleges, and mayors' and governors' offices, enabling them to respond to changing needs within volatile environments.

The Focused Conversation is one of the methods taught around the world as part of the "gateway" courses. ToP training provides structured facilitation methods to help groups think, talk, and work together. They enable highly energized, inclusive, and meaningful group collaboration that leads to successful outcomes.

Without effective methods like ToP, it is easy for meetings to fall into a lot of crosstalk that gets nowhere or to have a few dominate the conversation while others feel bored or excluded. More long-term and complex organization or community change projects often flounder because there is no consistent and authentic engagement of members and they do not feel ownership of the desired change.

ToP Methods support genuine participation, which leads to long-term commitment and quality outcomes, as well as more effective teamwork. ToP Methods recognize and honor contributions from all group members, identify commonalities, and pool contributions into useful patterns – all while welcoming diversity and minimizing conflict. The paradox of these methods is that they provide a structured approach to participation while enabling greater freedom of expression and voice. The Institute of Cultural Affairs (ICA) is known globally and locally for training in participatory methods for community and organizational development.





HALL OF FAME ALUMNUS RETURNS TO SBVC TO INSPIRE THE NEXT GENERATION OF SBVC ATHLETES



One number changed Tyree Washington's life: 44.52. It catapulted the Riverside native to stardom, taking him from the track at San Bernardino Valley College to the worldwide stage. 44.52 was the time he ran in 1997, when he broke the national record for 400 meters.

"It was the number two time in the world," Washington said. "I became this unknown to known athlete." It was all up from there. Washington went on to earn a bronze medal at the 1997 Outdoor World Championships and silver medals in the 200 and 400 meters at the 1998 Goodwill Games. In 2003, he was the Indoor World Champion for 400 meters, Outdoor World Champion for 400 meters, USA Indoor 400 meters champion, and World Outdoor silver medalist. Twice, Washington was the fastest man in the world.

Washington also excelled at football, and in the early 2000s was signed by the San Diego Chargers and picked up by the Oakland Raiders, but injuries derailed his time in the NFL. Now, he's bringing everything he learned from traveling the world and competing as a professional athlete to SBVC, where he is the new assistant coach for Track and Field.

Returning to SBVC "feels amazing," Washington said. "For me, Valley has always been home." To have this full circle moment and "come back and pass the baton to other students athletes, it's part of my mission in life, and I'm excited about it." As a coach, "you wear different hats," Washington said. Sometimes, he listens to them as if he's their father; other times, he's a therapist. "You're giving advice and leading them to the right direction, and equipping them with the right tools to be successful," he said. "I'm passing on what was given to me, and paying it forward."
