OUR ROLE

The Academic Senate primary purpose is to ensure that faculty have a voice in the governance and decision-making processes of the district, especially on all matters related to curriculum and academic standards. It ensures faculty involvement in decision-making processes, particularly in areas outlined in the "Ten Plus One," a set of guidelines detailed in Title 5.



ELIMINATE BARRIERS TO STUDENT ACCESS AND SUCCESS

The Umoja-Tumaini program is a learning community for students interested in learning about African-American history, literature, and culture. From October 2023 to present, Umoja has increased their program enrollment from 40 students to 256 and counting. With 11 cohorts that include English, Math, Psychology Student Development, History and Geography. Students have shared that they have great access to support and full service with Umoja, including diversity and feeling welcomed.

Yvette Lee, faculty of English, exemplifies SBVC's commitment to diversity and inclusion through her leadership of the campus Book Club:

SBVC's support systems played a crucial role in Denmark's success, demonstrating the college's commitment to equitable access to resources. "The biggest lesson I learned was asking for help," he noted. Denmark's aspirations to pursue a TESOL program and further his studies in Japan after graduating from Berkeley highlight SBVC's success in nurturing global perspectives and cross-cultural understanding among its diverse student body. His journey from SBVC to UC Berkeley and beyond serves as an inspiring example of how the college's commitment to diversity, equity, and anti-racism empowers students to overcome barriers and achieve their dreams.

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BE A LEADER AND PARTNER IN ADDRESSING REGIONAL ISSUES

Umoja Program has made collaborations with College Corps, which helps students with access to monetary awards to retain students. Currently, hosting 15 student volunteers.

Maria Lopez, counselor for Adult Education/ESL and is also the faculty lead for our Non-Credit. She will be attending Vision 2030: Noncredit Summit - Access and Inclusion: Transforming Communities through Noncredit Education on October 4th. In addition she will also be presenting on a panel with Mt. San Antonio College (Mt. SAC) to discuss.

This September, Cuny is launching the "Cinema of Journalism" screening series, featuring films on journalism and discussions with local experts. Under Professor Cuny's leadership, SBVC's FTVM program is evolving in thrilling ways, making it an exciting time to be a part of this vibrant community.
