From Bruce Baron. **Chancellor. SBCCD**

On behalf of the San Bernardino Community College District (SBCCD) and our Board of Trustees. I am pleased to bring you this Report to the Community. We provide an annual brief update of the current status of the Bond Program to share how significantly your tax dollars have impacted the lives of our students and our community.

The voters in our service area have twice supported the District's mission through Bond issuances. The work approved in the 2002 Measure P is now virtually finished. The voters approved Measure M in 2008, a \$500M general obligation bond, to continue long-needed improvements on both campuses designed through our master planning process. Because of several years of poor economy in California, we were unable to sell bonds. Many planned improvements have been put on hold because at this time, our \$500M bond program is now a \$258M bond program. We continue to annually evaluate opportunities to realize the balance of the bond.

Both bond programs have built classrooms, libraries, laboratories and career technical training facilities that are state of the art, so that our students are prepared to compete in a now-expanding global economy. We have also been able, through the Board of Trustees' Local Hire Policy, to ensure that the majority of the jobs on these projects are filled by local contractors, subcontractors and vendors using local workers.

In addition, we have successfully incorporated the Boards' Sustainability Plan into these new facilities, saving utility costs over the long-term through the use of LEED-certified construction, through extensive utilization of an energy management plan and by becoming an Energy Star partner.

Regulated by the Ralph M. Brown Public Meetings Act, the Citizens Bond Oversight Committee reviews expenditure reports to ensure that proceeds of both bonds are expended only for the purposes described in the ballot measures, and that no funds go for unauthorized operating expenses. We appreciate their continued dedication and service.

The SBCCD is now serving more students than we have in many years. Over 40,000 students come each year to our colleges for an Associate's Degree, to prepare to transfer to a four year institution, to earn a certificate in a particular skills program, or for courses to assist them with a better or new career.

Your continued support of the SBCCD means our residents can achieve a better future through a quality education, which improves life in the Inland Empire for everyone.

Certification of Expenditures

The SBCCD Interim Vice Chancellor of Business and Fiscal Services certifies that the bond proceeds for the fiscal year 2014 were expended only for the purposes set forth in the ballot measure and that no bond proceeds were used for teacher or administration salaries or for other operating expenses. The expenditures for fiscal year 2014 were audited by external auditors Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Company, and the findings presented to the CBOC in December 2014.

Issuance of Bonds

Bonds have been issued for the San Bernardino Community College District Measure P and Measure M construction programs as provided below:

Measure P

From May 2003-June 2009, Series A-E Bonds were issued in the amount of \$190,000,000. Series A and B were refinanced in 2005 and Series C in 2013. No further issuances will be made pursuant to Measure P.

Measure M

From December 2008-June 2009. Series A-C Bonds were issued in the amount of \$258,312,389. Series A was refinanced in 2013 Additional Series may be issued pursuant to law and the Bond issuance schedule, up to the approved amount of \$500,000,000.


For fiscal year 2015, the bond debt to be raised is \$21,914,987. Each property owner will be charged \$39.30 per \$100,000 of assessed value.

Bond Highlights for the Year at San Bernardino Valley College



Auditorium Renovation

This past year saw continuing progress on the college's construction master plan. By the end of the fiscal year renovations on our second oldest building, the Auditorium, were on track to be completed by August. The building now meets the accessibility requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), thanks to the addition of an elevator tower at the rear of the building, an interior elevator from the auditorium floor up to stage level, and taking out some seats to provide wider, wheelchair-accessible aisles, along with special wheelchair seating platforms.

The men's and women's bathrooms were completely redone and expanded. All-new lighting and sound systems have been installed, the former basement work area is now up on the main floor backstage and the ceilings, floors and walls have all been cleaned and renovated. There are now two serviceable outdoor courtyards for special events.

Athletics Complex

The fences went up and a new campus map showed how to get around the construction site for our new athletics complex, with a formal groundbreaking held in the fall semester, 2014. An all-new three-story gymnasium will be the first major step. The existing men's and women's gyms will remain open until the new one is ready to occupy.

Other Construction Bond Accomplishments

The remodel and expansion of the Business Building was completed in time for the Fall 2013 semester, as well as completion of the new Physical Plant facility. New security lighting was installed along K Street and our neighbors have expressed their happiness with the addition. We also completed the installation of an ACCESS bus shelter in parking lot 10.

Sports field upgrades included new fencing at the soccer field, discus pad and backstop, and foul ball netting for the baseball field.

Affecting our longer-term master plan, our contractor completed the design of phase 1 of retrofit work for the Applied Technology building.



Ongoing Projects:

- New Gymnasium/Sports Complex project is in full swing and is scheduled for completion in December 2016.
- The Applied Technology Phase I renovation project begins in January, 2015 and includes remodeling of the existing east facility to accommodate new welding stations, ventilation, electrical, HVAC, lighting, and numerous code upgrades.

Topping Out Ceremony for Crafton Center

A tradition of "topping out" a new building was followed for the Crafton Center. Topping out is a builders' rite traditionally held when the last beam (or its equivalent) is placed atop a structure during its erection.

To make the ceremony inclusive of campus, students, faculty and staff had an opportunity to "tag" the beam first. Painted Crafton green, everyone could contribute to the history of the campus by leaving their mark on the beam. It was then hoisted to its place on Wednesday, Oct. 8, 2014.

Completion of Crafton Center is expected in fall 2015.


